KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 27—(AP)—Mason Burley Sexton, 20, one of the central figures in the robbery and destruction of more than 10,000 ballots cast in the last general election in Jackson county, was one of the principal witnesses today in the trial of Earl H. Fehl, Jackson county judge, charged with complicity in

Sexton testified he and a group of others had stolen the ballots, burned some and cast others into the Rogue river. He was unshaken on cross-examination. He said that after arrangements for the robbery had been completed, Judge Fehl told him and his brother, "in a joking way," that "I'd hate to see anybody break into that vault and steal the ballots."

The state probably will complete its case aturday and the trial may go to the jury by the middle of next week.
