Captain Frank H. P. Partridge, who is in command of the Bear River camp, joined with Major McQuillan, Sheriff George Lucret of Amador county, and Captain Newell Stewart in helping the "roundup."

The youths, unaccustomed to mountain life, were thrown from the camp to Jackson tonight, it was reported, and fears for their safety was expressed if they get off the Alpine highway, which is the main road leading through the wild country above Jackson.

This would provide a \$20.80 weekly wage for the camps. In contrast southern wages as proposed were 22 1/2 cents with the same hours of work. With the increase in hourly wages would probably go a decrease in hours per week.

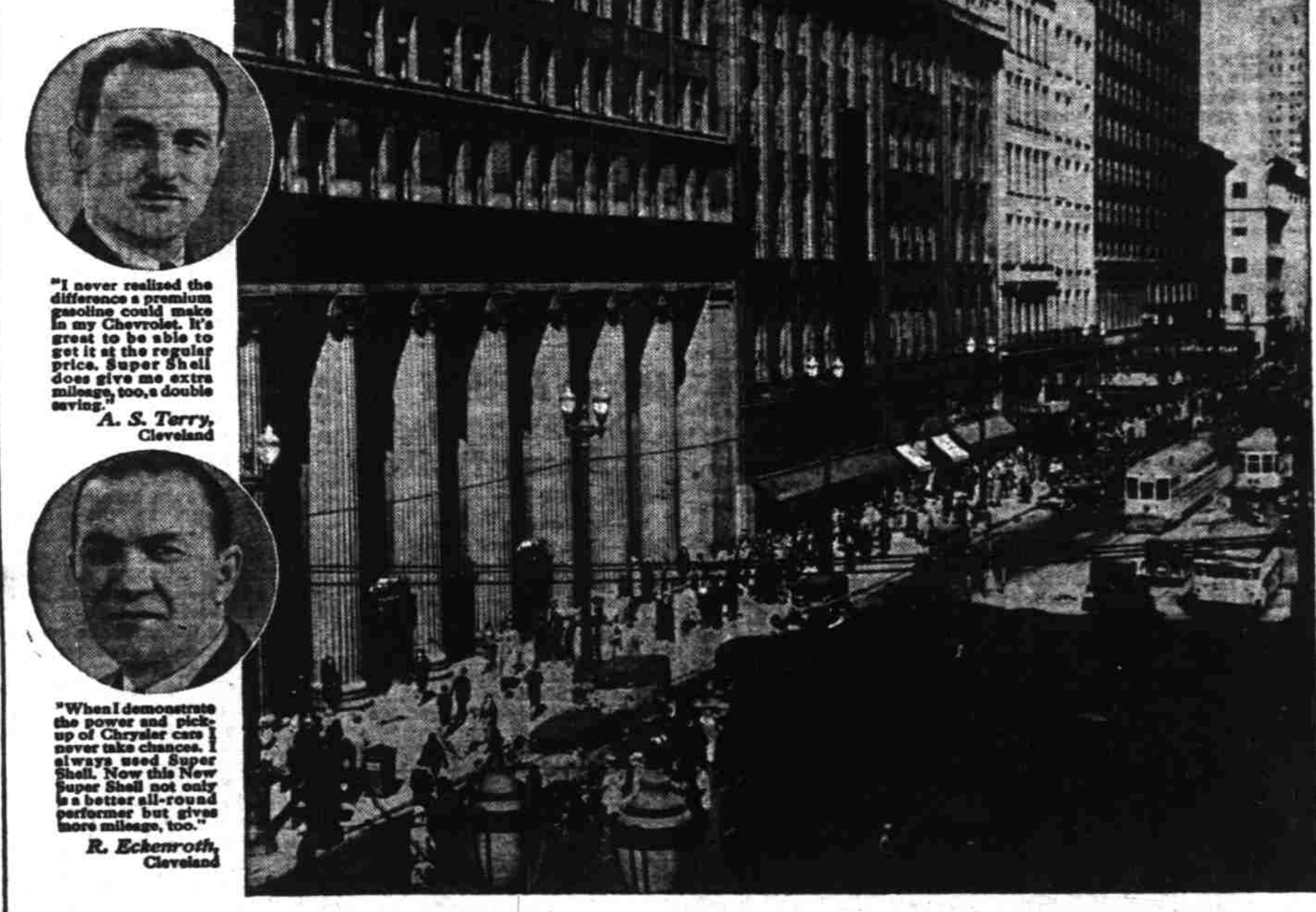
