Trucks used in transportation of seasonable crops are exempt from the provisions of the new truck and bus law placing regulation under the transportation department of the public utilities commissioner, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion issued Friday.

Truck used in conveying apple and wheat crops will be included in the exemption clause of the act, Van Winkle said. The opinion was requested by Herbert Hauser, superintendent of transportation. Enforcement of the entire act has been held up by injunction suits brought by the truck association

The attorney general also held, in another opinion, that insanity was insufficient cause for revocation of an engineer's certificate. The question was asked by Archy B. Carter, secretary of the state board of engineering examiners.


