**Sues Insurance Firm** — Frieda M. Smith has filed two suits in justice court against the Equitable Life assurance society. In one she seeks return of a \$109.20 semi-annual premium paid after she filed notice of permanent disability; and in the second she seeks \$751.32 disability benefits for the two months early this year. Mrs. Smith received judgment of \$226.98 against the company July 13 in a civil action over policy benefits.

**Time for Banks Longer** — Extension of time until August 15 was granted three state banks Monday by the banking board. Time for operation of these banks on a restricted basis would have terminated today, if negotiations for sale or merger are not pending August 15, it was indicated. The three are: The Albany State bank, operating with 10 per cent unrestricted deposits; the Bank of Woodburn, operating with 5 per cent unrestricted, and the Shute Savings bank at Hillsboro, operating with 5 per cent deposits unrestricted.

**Paving Started** — First concrete on the highway sector under construction north of Brooks was poured yesterday morning, the job being started near Woodburn, says Mrs. I. V. McAdoo of Gervais. Contractor Blake has recently set up machine shops at the west side of the Southern Pacific yards at Gervais. His paving plant is back of the depot there. Detours necessitated by the paving operations are easily passable though speed should be curbed in traveling them, motorists report.

**Repeal Costs Filed** — The campaign to initiate the measure for repeal of the state prohibition laws and the subsequent work prior to election on this as well as the repeal of the 18th amendment, cost the Oregon Hop Growers' association \$1418, expense statements filed with the secretary of state Monday showed. Previous statements filed with the state department on the initiative July 14 estimated the association would spend about \$985 from that date until election on the repeal measures.

## CATHOLIC DAY TO BE ANNUAL EVENT

### 2500 Gather at Champoeq Sunday; Entertainment Is Well Received

Catholics and their friends from all over western Oregon to the number of nearly 2,500, gathered at Champoeq park Sunday for observance of Catholic day. The event was so entirely successful that it was voted an annual affair, to be held the fourth Sunday in July each year, under auspices of the state council of Knights of Columbus, with details in charge of the four Marion county councils at Salem, Sublimity, St. Paul and Mt. Angel.

Sunday's program presided over by Clarence Brown of the Salem council, included two excellent addresses by Rev. Francis P. Leipsig of Eugene and Rev. L. A. Sander of Portland.

Musical features were provided by the Salem Haywire orchestra, representing the American Legion post here; the Mt. Angel band; a visiting radio artist from San Antonio, Texas; and Jacqueline Duke, 11-year-old musical prodigy of Portland who has attracted the attention of eastern musicians. Hundreds of groups enjoyed the picnic lunch at the park and many remained over for the evening meal, so ideal was the weather.

## Monner-Starker \$10,400 Damage Case is Begun

Trial of the case of Agnes Monner against J. A. Starker in which plaintiff seeks \$10,400 damages for injuries resulting from an auto accident on South Commercial street February 13, 1932, began Monday before Judge L. G. Lewelling here. Plaintiff, who is 16 years old, is represented by her father, Frank Monner, temporary guardian. He is proprietor of the Salem Tent and Awning company here.

Gross negligence is charged against the defendant who was driver of the car in which Miss Monner was seriously injured. Her sister, Frances, was killed. Starker was sued for damages by the latter's estate and a verdict was returned for the defendant. That case is now before the state supreme court on appeal.

Squad 2—R. Chambers and R. Farmer, D. Compton and F. Sanford, C. Elodgett and R. Ewing.

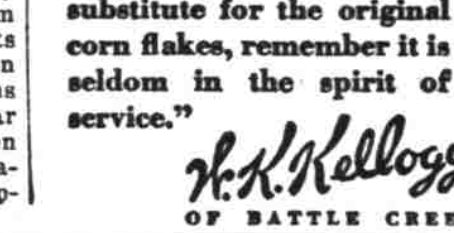
