Ellis said late yesterday he would call these department heads together sometime today to make detailed plans on the N. R. A. program furtherance here. Detailed instruction and material are expected shortly from Washington.

Ready Compliance Praised by Leader
"The spontaneous compliance of Salem people with the plans of N. R. A. is remarkable," Ellis said yesterday.

The local postoffice was forced to notify employers early yesterday that supplies of N. R. A. eagle emblems were exhausted here and no more could be issued until additional stores were received. When an organization "sells out" as quickly as that, the public is certainly behind it.

Ellis said scores of inquiries were coming to his office daily and almost all inquiries were cooperative to the purposes of N. R. A. The only difficulties were occasioned, he said, where a few employers were having trouble fitting N. R. A.'s program into their operations.

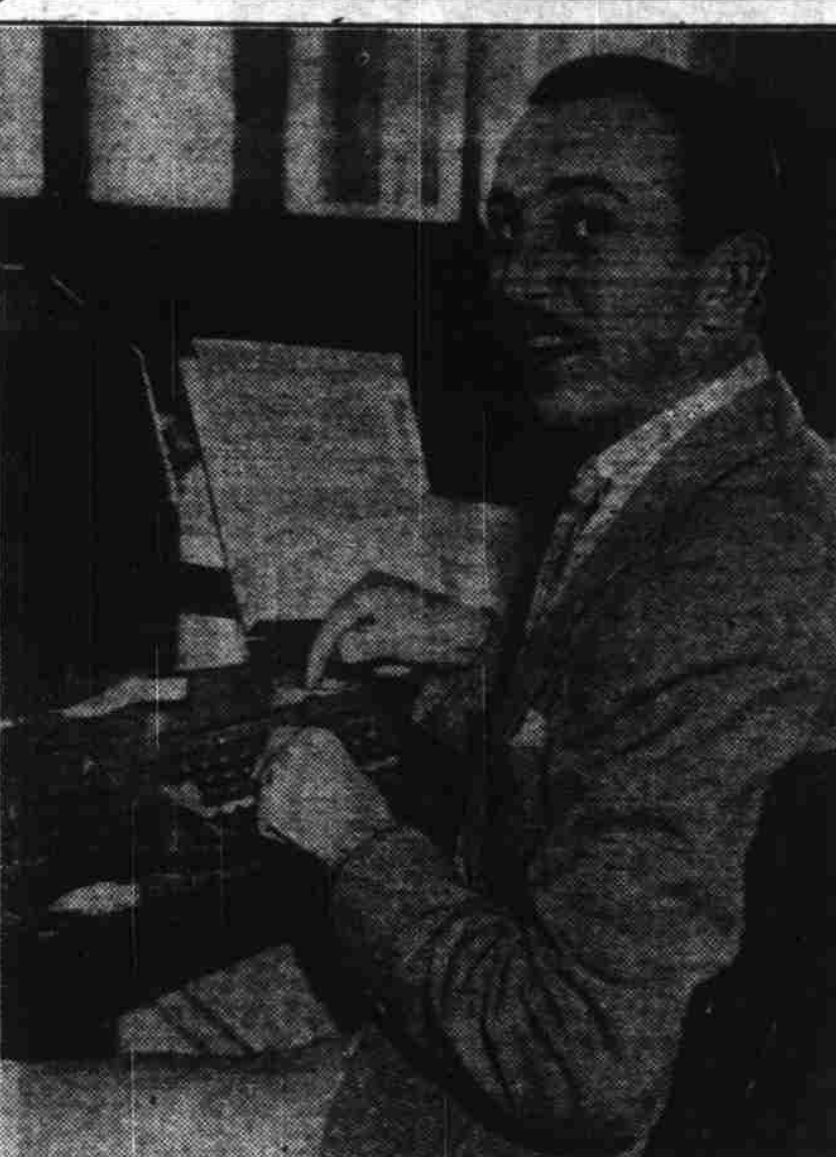

Johnson went before the cotton garment and kindred industries with his plan for a nation-wide purchasing drive which would favor those stores displaying the Blue Eagle.

"We know that unless your goods are moved off your shelves you cannot keep up your part of this program," the administrator said.

The time is approaching and the signal will be merely the certainty that this plan is working—that people are back at work with a certainty this is no flash in the pan.
"When that moment comes—and I think it is almost here—we are then going out in supplement to the drive that we are making to bring the whole country together on re-employment, to bring the whole country together on patronizing those people who aided in this great cooperative national movement."

FEDERAL FUND FOR SCHOOLS PROBABLE

Should Salem taxpayers and stockholders in taxed corporations here decide to bond themselves for \$210,000 toward the building and repairing of school buildings, a grant of \$90,000 federal money would be easily obtained was the opinion of federal emergency officials in Portland, Superintendent George W. Hug said yesterday. Hug was in Portland Tuesday conferring with authorities there, who told him that Salem is entitled to a large percentage of the federal emergency funds to be spent in Oregon.

Absolute approval of the plan for employing skilled labor here was expressed by members of the committee. Hug was authorized to make investigations as to the possibility of securing federal funds at a meeting of the school board here Monday night. The board will probably decide at its regular meeting Tuesday a light whether or not to lay the question before the taxpayers.
