VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 3—(AP)—Opium valued at \$10,500, contained in 110 tins, was found today on the liner Empress of Canada, which arrived from the Orient yesterday. At Honolulu opium valued at \$50,000 had been found on the Empress, and there she was fined \$40,500.

LINDY MAKES TRIP OVER BAFFIN LAND

NEW YORK, Aug. 3—(AP)—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh made a 600 mile round trip reconnoitering flight today between Holstenborg, Greenland,

and the East Central part of Baffin Land, Pan-American Airways was notified. A message from the steamer Julliane, mother ship of the Lindberghs' air mapping expedition, said the couple took off from Holstenborg at 7:30 a. m. (Eastern Standard Time) and crossed the Davis straits. The east central portion of Baffin Land was surveyed from the air and then the Lindberghs began the 300 mile return flight eastward. They reached Holstenborg at 12:40 p. m. (E.S.T.) Officials of the air line, for which Col. Lindbergh is technical adviser, said his flight presumably completed the couple's tour of that section of the north Atlantic, which they are studying to determine the practicability of an oceanic air route.

PRIVILEGES DENIED TO TERRY DRUGGAN

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Aug. 3—(AP)—Terrence Druggan, Chicago beer baron, was locked in the federal prison annex tonight, clothed in denim and stripped of his outside privileges, the granting of which brought suspension of three members of the prison staff. The department of justice announced today Druggan improperly had been accorded the rank of outside trustee, permitted to drive a prison truck and allowed to visit a girl friend in Leavenworth. The announcement added that Chaplain James A. Ording, Lester M. Wabler, a guard, and Vernon B. Swearingen, a motor mechanic "have been summarily suspended after admitting their part in the affair." The department of justice said today Druggan, imprisoned into in 1931 to serve a 3 1/2 year sentence as an income tax law violator, had been a persistent seeker for exemptions and special privileges "through influence or otherwise." His requests have been invariably denied.

Longest Window In State Being Put in Paddock

The longest window in Oregon—100 feet long and three feet high—is being placed in the paddock building on the state fairgrounds here. MRS. ROOSEVELT TO HEAD RELIEF DRIVE

NEW YORK, Aug. 3—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt has accepted the chairmanship of the women's committee of the mobilization for human needs, which directs the annual relief drive of 34 national welfare organizations. Mrs. Roosevelt, whose appointment was announced today by Newton D. Baker, chairman of the citizens' committee, will be the first president's wife to head actively a national committee devoted to welfare activities. Several other first ladies have served in honorary capacities. "I have accepted the chairmanship because of my conviction that the support of our community welfare services throughout the country is an essential factor in the recovery and maintenance of our normal American life," said Mrs. Roosevelt in a statement. "With the assumption by local, state and national governments of such large responsibility for purely material relief of distress, it is important to make perfectly clear the exact limitation of these government services and the very large and indispensable function of our voluntary social services in each community."

Opium Found by Boys Sells for 10 Cents a Tin

PORT ALBERNI, B. C., Aug. 3—(AP)—Four boys were wandering along the waterfront today when they had five cents apiece for ice cream. They found a sack containing 12 tins of opium which contained a black, sticky substance. They were about to toss them into the sea when a Chinese came along, gasped, and offered them 10 cents a tin. The boys sold five and jumped the price to 50 cents when the next Chinese came by. Police learned about their transactions, investigated and found the boys had one tin left. It contained opium the authorities valued at \$200.

Lumber Code is Awaiting Study, Hearing Records

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—(AP)—Analytical study of the hearing record on the steel industry's code of fair practice was the only activity today on this major agreement at the recovery administration. Deputy Administrator K. M. Simpson, in charge of the steel proceedings turned over the task of studying the record to an assistant. Lumber's code was in a similar situation, although Dudley Cates, administrative assistant in charge of that code, was looking forward to an early solution.

Heat Abates at New York After 2 More Deaths

NEW YORK, Aug. 3—(AP)—New York's three-day heat wave broke today, but its cumulative effects killed two more persons. A northwest wind stopped the thermometer at 84 degrees early in the afternoon, and by early evening the temperature had fallen another 10 degrees, aided by a light rain. Besides two deaths attributed directly to the heat, there were four drownings in the metropolitan district.

RELIEF FOR HOME OWNERS SPEEDED

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 3—(AP)—Orders for immediate and quick administration of the two billion dollars for relief of debt burdened small home owners were given today by President Roosevelt.

In a talk with Vincent Dalley, New York state manager of the Home Owners Loan corporation, the president emphasized he wanted to extend at the earliest possible moment this federal aid to reduce the debts of the home owners.

Dalley assured him he would be ready to offer the 4 per cent government bonds in exchange for the 6 and 7 per cent interest bearing mortgages early next week.

Dalley's declaration "we are going to the people rather than waiting for them to come to us" was regarded as reflecting the action which the president wants other state administrators of this fund to take.

Dalley estimated 30 per cent of the total federal funds, or about \$600,000,000, will be employed in New York.
