Grover, was authorized to contract with Dr. J. C. Hawthorne for the care of the insane for \$5.50 a week for the term of four years. In 1878, Governor W. W. Thayer was authorized to renew the contract for

six years, at \$5 a week. This act, passed October 18, provided that the husband or parents or estate of the person committed be charged with the expense of conveyance to the asylum.

October 25, 1880, an act was passed making the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer a board of commissioners of the asylum for the insane, and appropriating \$25,000 from the general fund and levying a special tax of one mill for the erection of buildings.

October 23, 1883, the asylum was opened with the admission of 320 patients. It is now known as the Oregon state hospital, Salem. The Eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton was established through an initiative measure in 1910. It receives all patients from east of the Cascades, excepting Klamath and Lake counties.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4. - (AP) -Unusual curtailment of active speculative buying power led to a big downward slide of grain values today.

Adverse crop news was plentiful, but appeared to have become ineffective to attract broad public interest.

Wheat closed nearly stagnant at the day's bottom figures, 3 cents to 4 cents under yesterday's finish, corn 2-2 1/4 down, oats 1 1/4-3 % off.
