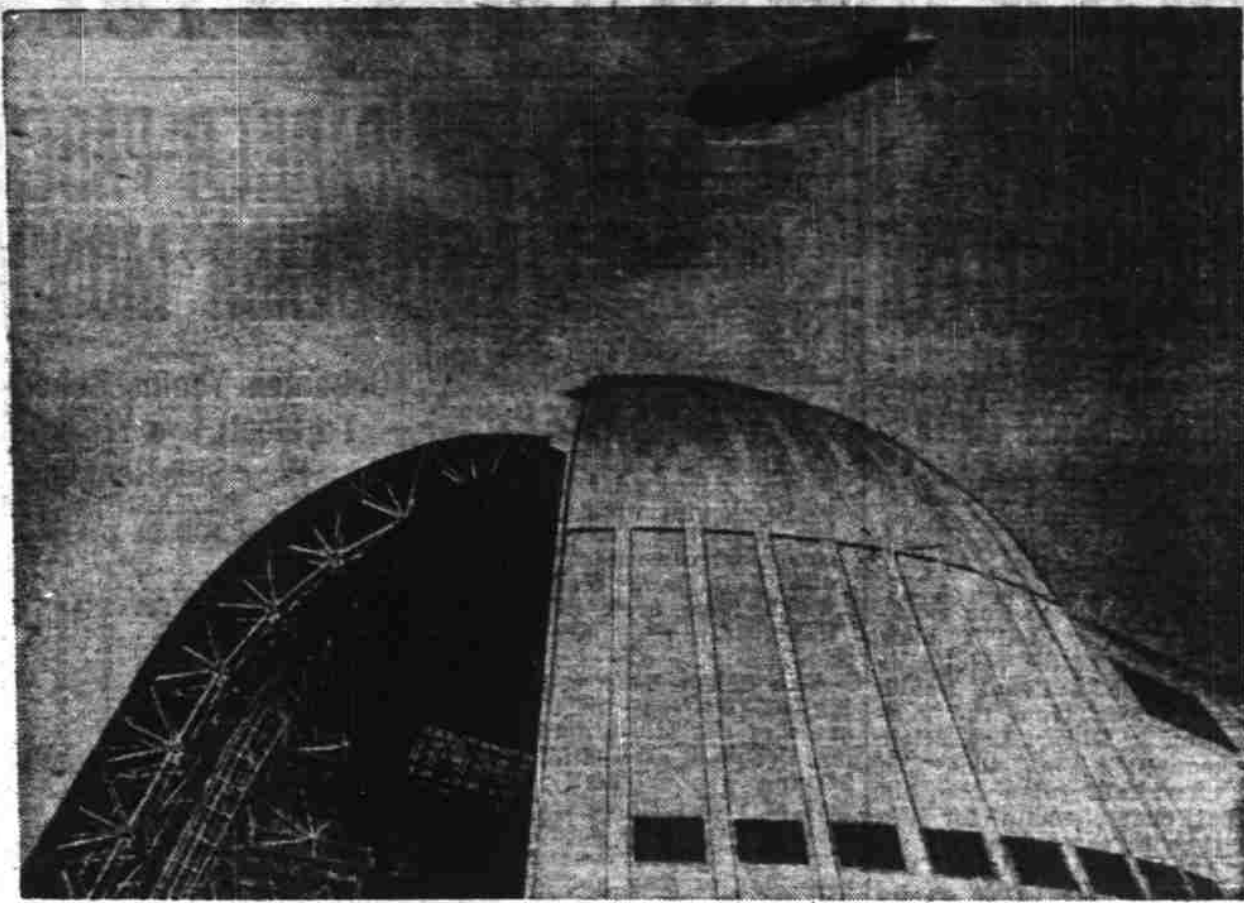


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PREPARING FOR THE MACON AT SUNNYVALE

Taylor died in Juneau last month a day before Burton arrived there. Vote on Beer Sale Plea at Monmouth; Opposition Active

MONMOUTH, Aug. 5.—Beer has never been sold in Monmouth, but there is considerable agitation at the present time concerning ordinance number 1 of the charter which prohibits such sale.

At this week's council meeting two petitions were presented relating to legalized beer. In one petition 49 legal voters asked that a special election be held on amendment of the charter to permit sale of S.B. This received a nay vote. A second petition signed by 125 legal voters protested any change in the charter as it now stands, also protested holding of a special election. After some discussion it was voted to hold a special election which will be called in the near future.

Reemployment Campaign in County Launched When State Chief Visits

ty who have lived here for one year or more. Single men as well as married men will be eligible to enroll and while consideration is to be made of the number of men dependent on the applicant for support, employment will not be based solely on the number of dependents.

Contractors, under federal specifications, will be compelled to secure all help save for the stated exceptions, through the reemployment bureau in the county where work is being done. Permission to discharge men for incompetency is granted but men released must be replaced from bureau registered applicants.

The new reemployment service here will not supersede the present office on Court street but will work with it. The local committee is to meet Monday and to give further consideration to selection of local management for the bureau as well as the location of the employment headquarters.

Not until local administrative leaders for the bureau are chosen, headquarters determined and printed forms for registration obtained, will reemployment registration begin.

Other Bureaus Will Be Established Soon

Johnson said the state director, E. L. Mersereau, who was named last week, will see that reemployment bureaus are quickly established in Portland and here and at Astoria, Albany, Medford, Klamath Falls, The Dalles, Eugene and Baker. Subsequently as federal projects develop in other sections of the state, more bureaus will be opened.

As federal funds are allocated to cities, counties or school districts for construction work, workers will obtain their positions through these agencies.

Each registrant will be carefully checked on his past experience, his specific qualifications, his residence and other data essential for the employer to know in hiring men.

The local reemployment committee is to coordinate its work with the Marion county relief committee appointed by Governor Julius L. Meier in the same manner that the state relief committee, headed by Raymond Wilcox, is cooperating with E. L. Mersereau, state director of reemployment. Funds for operating the offices throughout the country are to come jointly from the national public works appropriation and from the federal relief budget.

The Marion county court will also cooperate locally in getting the reemployment service under way. When the local organization has been set up, employers other than those having contracts for construction work, will be solicited to use the reemployment bureau as an agency to secure new workers for their businesses.
