Ambler, district manager, General Foods Sales company, Inc., today announced that in signing the president's re-employment agreement, his company is putting this agreement into operation in more than 50 factories and sales offices with which the local organization is affiliated.

Factory workers whose working time has been reduced from 40 to 35 hours per week will continue to receive the same rate of weekly pay they formerly received, according to Ambler.

Those factory employees who have been working longer than 40 hours a week are having an equitable adjustment made in their hourly rates of pay to conform with the spirit of the agreement.

SEVEN DROWNED IN MEXICO TORRENTS

MEXICO, D. F., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Seven persons were reported drowned Saturday at Monterrey, Mexico, in floods following a tropical hurricane carrying torrential rains.

Thousands were rendered homeless. More than a quarter of the city was isolated or under water tonight.

Three hundred homes in one lowland quarter were leveled by the almost unprecedented floods. Residents fled to higher ground.

The large Santa Catarina river, which in 1909 drowned hundreds of citizens, was straining its levees and some of the better class residences were threatened.

Truckmen of State Agree On New Code

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Truck owners of the state, meeting here Saturday, approved a code of fair competition for the Oregon trucking industry in accordance with the national recovery program.

The code would provide a minimum wage scale of 50 cents an hour for men working on trucks and in warehouses and freight sheds, and would make the maximum working week 40 hours. The meeting was called by the Allied Truck Owners, Inc. Virtually every branch of the industry in this state was reported represented.

Agreement was made that log haulers, sand and gravel haulers, milk truckers and all such specialized branches of the industry should set up price agreements in their own communities, all to be governed by such tariffs as are approved by the owners of 80 per cent of the trucks.

Leland James of Portland, president of the Allied Truck Owners, presided at the meeting.
