GENTLEMAN AL IS BACK AGAIN

Youngster who Beat Reed Again in Limelight; Fans Like him

He may have an opportunity to prove that he meant it here tonight at the armory, for Everett Kibbons, with whom he is matched in the heavyweight half of the double main event, is a clean wrestling young fellow, recently out of college. But Kibbons refuses to turn the other cheek, and the chances are that both big boys will get a little peevish over some little accident that may come up, and then the fun will begin.

Cecil Bennett, despite the cool, business like manner in which he overcame Robin Reed here a week ago, is an extremely boyish, enthusiastic fellow and he was mightily tickled over that victory which he confided, marked a high point in his career to date.

The fans were all for Bennett last Tuesday night and he probably will get their support again tonight when he moves into action against "Swede" Lawson. The customers have nothing against the Scandinavians, but when they pick a favorite they don't drop him again right away, and Bennett certainly caught the popular fancy.

"Bearcat" Arnold and "Prof." Newton are expected to produce some excitement in their 30-minute opener.

Canny old age triumphed over exuberant youth Sunday on Olinier field when the doddering Albany Alcos squeezed out a 6 to 5 victory over the Salem Senators. Old "Chinky" Coovert lobbed the horseshoe across the corners of the plate for eight innings and "got by" because the Solons were swinging at it from their heels and seldom meeting it squarely.

Then, handed a one-run lead going into the ninth, Manager Wilkinson of the Alcos varied the menu by sending in a young pitcher, Hampton, with a sneaker fast ball and the change was effective in preventing any further Senator rally.

The Senators committed five bobbles at unfortunate times, and were victims of some other luckless occurrences, notably Oravec's striding over second base without touching it as he made the circuit on a long drive to left field which brought in three runs. It was an easy home run, aside from the technicality. That occurred in the seventh, and the three runs put Salem ahead. One more was scored in the eighth, but the Alcos scored two on an error in the ninth to win.
