

POMONA PICNIC HAS BIG CROWD

300 Grangers Gather at Silverton; Esson, Hewitt Are Speakers

SILVERTON, Aug. 7.—"We are questioning everything today," said the Rev. Allyn Esson of Albany, in his Sunday afternoon talk before 300 grangers and friends gathered for the Marion Pomona picnic at the municipal park at Silverton.

"A lot of the people who used to believe in the infinite God," he continued, "have become of the opinion that He can be dethroned, that religion is something that you make up for yourself to suit your own particular personality."

Rev. Mr. Esson stressed the need of what he termed "the old fashioned religion."

"If we stopped a moment," he said, "to look back and see what our fathers and mothers, our pioneers, did and believed, I am of the opinion we would find them almost as smart as we think we are."

Idealism Questioned

Americans, Rev. Mr. Esson thought, had regarded themselves as the idealists of the world. If they are real Americans, he said, their purpose should be only to live so that the world is a better place for their having lived in it. During the past few years the entire world, including Americans, has been getting away from this. He suggested that each and everyone earnestly endeavor to "get back."

"It is a pitiful thing," he said, "to come to the end of life and feel you have missed everything along the way."

Other things on the afternoon program included a community singing of old time hymns; reading, Stella Culver of Macleay; vocal duet by Glenn and Ernest Sargent of Chemawa; instrumental selections by the Leslie family of the Silverton Hills; tap dance and acrobatic numbers by June and May Leslie.

Hewitt Gives Address

The grange picnic opened with 11 o'clock services at which Roy Hewitt of Salem delivered the address. His address was based on Christ's sermon on the mount. Roswald Wright of Ankeny grange was in charge of special music which consisted of a vocal duet by Mr. Wright and Rex Hartley, also of Ankeny; a vocal solo by Mr. Hartley. T. C. Sweeney of Monitor read the scripture and Mrs. Sweeney, Pomona chaplain, offered the closing prayer.

L. S. Lambert, master of Pomona, was in charge of the morning meeting and Mrs. T. W. Bump, lecturer, of the afternoon program.

MEHAMA PAVILION BURNED TO GROUND

MEHAMA, Aug. 7.—The Mehama dance hall burned to the ground early Sunday morning. Mrs. Floyd Monroe, who lives just above the dance hall on the hill, was awakened by the noise of the fire at 4 a. m. and she with her son, Dale, called Phillips and other people from their beds in order to watch other property near.

The hall at this time was already so nearly burned that it was impossible to fight the blaze. The building was entirely covered on the roof and outside with corrugated tin roofing and was considered practically fireproof.

How the fire originated is unknown but it was evidently started from the inside where there was a roaring furnace when first discovered. No insurance was carried on the building and the loss is considerable as it was a large and well made hall. If the fire had occurred before the rain the chances are the entire town would have been wiped out as the hall is situated near the hotel and stores. A dance had been held Saturday night with a large attendance and at the time the dance broke up there was no sign of a fire.
