FORGERY SCANDAL IN KANSAS PROBED

TOPEKA, Aug. 10.—(AP)—National guard officers, wearing side arms, were posted in the office of Tom Boyd, state treasurer upon order of Gov. Alf M. Landon as state accountants began an examination of records and bonds in the treasurer's office in connection with Kansas' sensational municipal bond forgery scandal.

The guardsmen, who are civilian officers, are under orders to permit no bonds or records to be taken from the vaults or offices. Two officers were posted in the treasurer's office today and were relieved by others tonight. The guardsmen will stand on duty day and night until the check is completed.

While posting of the guards was in effect martial law in Boyd's office, Governor Landon did not term his action the declaring of martial law. Business of the state treasurer's office, other than bond transactions, was carried on as usual.

Boyd made no comment on the governor's action although at the time the first officer, Capt. Chester Thomas, took charge of the vault, Boyd questioned his authority.

USES OF REDUCED ACREAGE LEARNED

DALLAS, Aug. 10.—Partial information has been received stating what use may be made of the reduced wheat acreage by those farmers signing the federal agreement under the adjustment act and bonus payment plan. The contract signed by each state:

"The contracted acres of 1934 and 1935 may be used only as follows: Summer fallowed; planted to soil improvement or erosion-preventing crops; for food crops for the production of livestock for consumption or use on this farm; but not for the production of any nationally produced agricultural product for sale."

The extension service in each state will advise what crops can be grown under the law in that state, as the land taken out of wheat production will vary in different sections. It is expected that the extension service of Oregon state college will release the crops for this section shortly.

DISSIDENTS SLAY MOROCCO TROOPS

RABAT, Morocco, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Furious hand to hand fighting during which 42 soldiers were killed battling dissidents at Djebel Babou Sunday were reported in dispatches reaching Rabat today.

Two officers and 53 soldiers were wounded. The dissidents made a heavy surprise attack upon the troops who were cleaning out the region, but were driven off after an all-night struggle.

The dissidents fled and the troops were continuing the cleaning up movement, surrounding Djebel Babou from the north. Four converging columns each consisting of French and native infantry, cavalry and artillery and a battalion of the Foreign Legion, as well as native partisans, for some months have been clearing out the last dissident strongholds in the Atlas mountains.

GOBS SCORNFUL OF REDS' PROPAGANDA

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Aug. 10.—(AP)—The communist party of America bombarded sailors and marines of the Pacific fleet with literature attacking the administration of the federal government, but the fleet sailed away amid chorus of "razzberries for Russia."

A group of men met liberty parties from the fleet recently with stacks of literature charging President Roosevelt's administration was favoring the capitalistic classes at the expense of the workers. The sailors and marines made confetti out of the handbills and tossed them to the four winds. Discourteous remarks were made to the "reds."

"Nertz to you, Pinkie," said one goby, scanning the proffered

"Red" Handbill, "where's the dance hall?" The sailors came in for a farewell dance, and paid little attention to the literature, police said, so the discouraged distributors left hastily.

Two Men Fined for Fishing Violations In Woodburn Area

WOODBURN, Aug. 10.—John Knorr, and Clair Sutzingar appeared in justice court to charges of violating the fishing laws. Knorr was fined \$25 and costs for fishing without a license but the fine was suspended due to the fact that he was not acquainted with Oregon laws, having been in the state just a few days. Sutzingar admitted guilty to the charge of fishing with a snag hook and line and was fined \$25 and costs. His fine was also suspended on condition that he pay the costs. He was placed on probation for one year and his fishing tackle confiscated.
