Crab Stuffed Tomatoes

Crab Stuffed Tomatoes
8 large firm tomatoes
1 cup crab meat
1 cup diced celery
1 cup diced cucumbers
1 cup chopped green peppers
2 tablespoons chopped pickles
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 cup stiff mayonnaise
Wash and peel tomatoes. With spoon, scoop out part of insides. Chill tomato cases. Mix 1-3 of mayonnaise with remaining ingredients. Stuff tomato cases, arrange on lettuce and surround with rest of mayonnaise.

Nut Bread (2 loaves)
2 cups graham flour
3 cups flour
1-3 cups sugar
1-4 teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons molasses
2 eggs
2-3 cup nuts
3 cups sour milk
2 tablespoons butter, melted
Mix ingredients and blend well. Pour into 2 greased loaf pans and let rise 15 minutes. Bake 1 hour in moderately slow oven.

Peach Shortcake
2 cups pastry flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons butter
2-3 cup milk
Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Using a knife cut in the butter and slowly add milk. When soft dough forms, divide into 8 pieces and shape into small cakes. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven. While warm, split and add peaches.

3 cups fresh peaches
2-3 cup sugar
2 cups whipped cream
Mix peaches and sugar. Place portions between split shortcakes. Replace tops and add rest of peaches. Top with whipped cream and serve with forks.

Other fresh fruit or berries can be used in place of peaches and ice cream can replace whipped cream if desired.

PLENTY OF LABOR AVAILABLE, WORD

There is an abundance of labor available in Oregon at the present time despite the various seasonal occupations and the prospects for hop picking absorbing a large number of men and women. C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, announced in a report issued Wednesday. Gram said copies of the report would be sent to the officials of Washington, California and Idaho.

A tabulation received from Portland advised Gram that there are 17,500 heads of families and approximately 4000 unmarried men unemployed there. "We have plenty of labor to take care of all local activities," the Portland report said.

Approximately 1000 unemployed persons were reported in the Salem district. This report indicated that ample labor was available until the hop picking season. START C

Trouble Spots In Coal Region All Cleared up

UNIONTOWN, Pa., Aug. 10—(AP)—Lingering trouble spots in the Pennsylvania mine strike are cleared up, bringing peace to the embattled soft coal fields and sending thousands of the men back to the mines.

The last of the Payette county miners to remain on strike—200 workers in the H. C. Erick company's Colonial No. 4 mine at Grindstone—resumed work after federal and state agencies interceded to smooth over fresh grievances in a dispute concerning checkweighmen.

Striking miners of the Pittsburgh Terminal Coal corporation, also at odds with the operators over the question of selecting checkweighmen, voted to return to the mines tomorrow.

IRRIGATION TOUR DATES ANNOUNCED

Dates for the fourth annual Willamette valley irrigation tour have just been announced as August 23 and 30 by the Oregon State college extension service, which has sponsored this trip of inspection the last few years.

The two-day tour this year will be confined to the northern part of the valley, probably not extending south of Corvallis. Some new territory to be covered will be irrigation systems in Multnomah and Clackamas counties.

Places to be visited this year will include farms where practically the entire cultivated acreage is irrigated, says Art King, extension soils specialist who arranges the tour. In the early days of irrigation usually only a single field on a place would be watered, but now there are a growing number of fully irrigated farms, he reports.
