MAY POST REWARD FOR JONES SLAYER

Late Friday night the county court had not decided whether to post a reward for the apprehension of the robber who held up and killed Howard Jones, night watchman at the Valley Packing company plant. The shooting occurred early last Sunday morning. It was thought that the county would be asked to post a reward of \$500.

After exhausting every available clue to the identity of the robber or robbers, state and city police have obtained no favorable result. Since rewards formerly offered in similar cases have brought criminals to arrest and conviction, it was thought that this procedure might be effective in the present case.

Jones was fatally wounded in an exchange of shots with a robber who apparently intended to blow a safe in the office of the packing company. It is not known whether the robber had accomplices.

to leave for their homes yesterday.

One woman was hurt in the small tornado which cut a 75-foot path through the outskirts of Lewistown. Most of the buildings in its path suffered severe damage.

A rainfall of 7.5 inches from the cloudburst was recorded at Mount St. Mary's college at Emmitsburg. Most of the highways were under water for a time and several cars were abandoned in the flooded area.

Most of the creeks in the vicinity of Emmitsburg had receded last night but the Monocacy river at Buckeyston, near Frederick, was nearly 13 feet above normal and still rising. Scores of summer campers along its banks were driven from their cottages and some livestock was reported lost.

Many cornfields in western Maryland were leveled by the rain but farm bureau officials said the rain meant thousands of dollars to the farmers. The section had been suffering from a long dry period.

SCHOOL FOR DEAF GRADS TO GO EAST

The state board of control Friday approved the recommendation of J. Lyman Steed, superintendent of the state school for the deaf, that three graduates of the institution be sent to Gallaudet college for the deaf at Washington.

The three students who received credits required for admission to the eastern institution are Virginia Stacks, Eugene; Francis Grote, Salem, and Herman Brekke of Silverton.

The board also approved the purchase of 10 snow plows for the state highway department. The low bid of \$343 each, was presented by the Isaacson Iron Works of Portland.

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, reported that he yesterday conferred with Richard E. Dillehunt, in charge of the Oregon Medical school in Portland, with relation to the treatment of patients in some institution to be established on the University of Oregon Medical school campus. He said the investigation has not proceeded beyond the preliminary stage.

A strip of desert territory on the border line between Utah and Arizona, penetrated by hardly a score of persons in the past 20 years, came to life again when the movie troupe filming Zane Grey's "Heritage of the Desert," action romance of the west, which comes to the Capitol theatre today with a cast headed by Randolph Scott, Sally Blane and J. Farrell MacDonald, chose it as the locale for outdoor sequences.

The picture made there follows the original Zane Grey novel closely. It tells the story of a young surveyor who becomes involved in the battle between a group of honest ranchmen and a group of unprincipled cattle rustlers, and so distinguishes himself that he wins himself a prominent spot in the hearts of the ranchmen in general and the daughter of the ranch in particular.

Smith Seeks Damages for 1919 Injury

A. R. Smith has filed a complaint with the Marion county court, in which he asks damages of \$10,000 for injuries in an accident more than 14 years ago.

In early July, 1919, says the complaint, the county was engaged in road work near Whittell school, about eight miles southeast of Salem. Large quantities of explosives and detonators for firing them, which were used in the road work, were stored in the schoolhouse, according to the complaint. Although the detonators, encased in bright copper sheathing, were the sort of thing to attract playing youngsters, no warning of their dangerous character was posted near these explosive materials.

The school yard, equipped with a playground, was frequently used by children of the community as a gathering place. On July 2, 1919, the plaintiff, then only a youngster, played with some of the detonators, along with other children of the neighborhood. One of the detonators, avers the complaint, exploded and blew one of the plaintiff's eyes from its socket.

A splinter from the copper jacket of the detonator injured the other eye, played with steadily grown weaker until at present the plaintiff has only about one-fifth normal vision from it. Other injuries to fingers, face and body were sustained by Smith.

The complaint states that the plaintiff, who was a minor at the time of the accident, attained his majority last February. Damages are sought because the county failed to give notice of the dangerous nature of the explosive materials stored near the playground.

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STUDY OF CANNERY WASTE ORGANIZED

Consulting Engineers Meet Here; W. G. Allen one of Group Making Plans

Creation of a planning committee and acquisition of a group of experts to assist in outlining plans for eliminating of cannery waste from the Willamette river and its tributaries, resulted from a meeting of a board of consulting engineers composed of Ray E. Keon, John W. Cunningham and Robert G. Dieck, all of Portland, here Friday.

The engineers are working in cooperation with the state reconstruction advisory board, of which Governor Meier is chairman. The planning committee is composed of J. O. Holt, Eugene; Dean Wray, Woodburn; William Crapo, Portland; Ray Yokum, and W. G. Allen, Salem. Meeting with this committee were Dean H. S. Rogers of Oregon State college and E. L. Crockett, assistant supervisor of the state game commission.

It was proposed at the afternoon session to leave the technical work to Dean Rogers, who will be assisted by experts from the state horticultural products department and the state chemical and sanitary division. These experts, operating with Dean Rogers, will formulate a program and budget which will be presented to the Northwest Cannery association for consideration and approval. As soon as the program and budget are approved the technical committee will complete its report which will be presented to the board of engineers of the governor's committee.

The technical group is composed of Dr. C. S. Keovil, Professor F. Meryfield and Professor Wiegand, all of Oregon State college. The study will include: Quantity of cannery waste, and nature of pack; tonnage of offal produced; oxygen demand of offal; oxygen demand of waste water; waste in ratio to population; methods and progress in treatment and disposal of cannery waste.

Cannery operators from many sections of the Willamette valley attended the meeting, and it was agreed that action should be taken without delay. Keon declared that the time element was important for the reason that the sewage disposal question affects 63 incorporated towns and cities in this state. Crockett said the game commission would contribute \$50, while the cannery indicated that they would take care of the remainder of the expense involved in the preliminary study.

Sheriff Happens On Gang Slaying, Kills 2 Gunmen

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Sheriff Thomas B. Bash early today shot to death two men who, in a motorcar, were pursuing a man on foot. The man on foot also was slain. Officers theorized the sheriff had happened upon a gang shooting. Immediate identification of the three was not made.

The sheriff, with his wife and friends, were returning from a party when he saw the pursuit. He seized a riot gun in the car and opened fire.

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SILVER FALLS PARK ROAD ABOUT READY

Surfacing of Four Miles on South Side Virtually Completed, Word

Surfacing of the four miles of secondary highway leading out of the south side of Silver Falls State park is virtually completed, Hedda Swart, county engineer, announced Friday. The road is a part of the state's system of secondary highways and funds for the grading and surfacing have been furnished by the state. Work has been done by the county.

The new route through the Matheon place is one-tenth of a mile shorter than the old road from the South Falls and the grade is considerably better.

Mr. Swart said sufficient gravel had been obtained to cover most of the area used for a parking place in the park near the South Falls. Dust noticeable here at the Kiwanis picnic in July has thus been covered up. Swart says the park can be used for parking now throughout the year.
