Camp Business Slow—The municipal auto camp has averaged about 15 registrations per night so far this month. While this average is substantially lower than that of three or four years ago, it compares favorably with that of last year. This week the county's portable canning equipment is at the campground canning string beans for Salem residents. The truck is set up beside the creek bank, and several work tables have been placed under the nearby trees. The cannery has prepared between 400 and 900 cans per day, and late yesterday afternoon it looked as though the Friday total would be close to the 1000 mark.

Windshield Shattered—Col. W. G. D. Mercer narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday morning when his car was forced to run into a truck, parked on State street between Commercial and Liberty streets. Some lumber, which extended beyond the body of the truck, jammed through the windshield of Mercer's car and tore most of it away. Despite the shower of glass, Col. Mercer was uninjured, and after talking briefly with the driver of the truck he drove his damaged machine away. Mercer was forced against the back of the truck by a sudden traffic jam which occurred because of a car double-parked on the north side of State street, he said.

Protest Receiver—Joseph M. LaFollette and other members of the family have filed protest against the appointment of a receiver in the mortgage foreclosure case held against them by the Union Central Life Insurance company. They argue that they have cared for the property efficiently, have improved it to a normal value of \$40,000, and that they can continue to care for this property better than any receiver, since it has been their home for many years. They object that sale of the property now could not bring any substantial percentage of its normal value.

Bagley Assigned—Circuit Judge Bagley of Hillsboro has been assigned by Chief Justice Rand of the state supreme court to preside at the trial of Donald J. Ryan of Oregon City, who is under indictment charged with the misappropriation of trust funds, while he was serving as clerk of Clackamas county. The trial was set for September 11. Judge Latourette was disqualified from hearing the case for the reason that Ryan previously served as his clerk. Ryan is a member of the state legislature and has been prominent in Clackamas county for many years.

Hearing at Ontario—Hearing of the application of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company and Oregon Short Line, for permission to abandon the branch line now in operation between Vale and Brogan, a distance of 22 miles, will be held at Ontario Thursday, September 7, under the direction of Charles A. Thomas, state utility commissioner. The application originally was filed with the interstate commerce commission, which later requested Thomas to conduct the hearing.

Case Appealed—Transcript of testimony in the case of Johnson against Feskens was recorded with the county clerk Friday preparatory to an appeal being filed by plaintiff with the state supreme court here. The suit involved an unfulfilled contract. Plaintiff asked specific performance. The court held Feskens entitled to his equity because Johnson had not served notice on defendant when the latter broke the contract, informing Feskens of his intended procedure.

Lindley claims an overseas war record and says he was a member of the famous battalion lost in the Argonne forest for five days.

Two Industrial Deaths—There were two fatalities in Oregon resulting from industrial accidents during the week ending August 10, according to a report released by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Henry W. Oddy, Coquille, pile driver, and Hjalmar Nystrom, bucker, Wauna. There were 614 industrial accidents reported to the commission during the week.

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OREGON CITY BOND DEAL FOUND VALID

Old State Commission was Within its Authority Van Winkle Avers

The so-called old state bond commission acted within the authority provided by the Oregon statutes when it approved the purchase by the state of Oregon City refunding bonds in the amount of \$65,000, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Friday. The opinion was requested by Governor Meier.

The records show that these bonds were purchased when Charles T. Early, member of the state industrial accident commission, was a member of the state bond commission. Early subsequently died and was succeeded by T. Morris Dunn of Portland. Governor Meier and Dunn later refused to confirm the purchase and raised the question that the bonds were in default. Governor Meier, in a letter to Attorney General Van Winkle, declared that the bonds matured May 1, 1933, and the purchase was not made until 17 days later.

"I find from the record upon which such refunding bonds were issued," Attorney General Van Winkle's opinion read, "that the necessary proceedings were taken by officers of Oregon City for the issuance of such bonds during the months of March and April, 1933 and on April 18, 1933. Notice was forwarded by Oregon City to the state treasurer's office of the acceptance of the commission's bid for such bonds, and an opinion issued approving such bond issue on April 29, 1933, with the exception that the required publication of notice of sale of bonds had not been published for the required length of time."

"It further appears that the repudiation of such notice was thereafter made for the required time and the bid of the bond commission again accepted and the sale awarded on May 17."

Hoss Expected To Return Soon

Return of Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, to his office here shortly after September 1, is expected at the statehouse. While members of Mr. Hoss' official family are not fully informed about the secretary of state's plans, it was reliably reported Friday that Mr. Hoss was definitely contemplating an early return. His health is said to be considerably improved after a number of weeks in the state tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles. He is now vacationing and resting "somewhere in eastern Oregon."

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Large Hollyhock Resembles Tree; Is 162 Inches Tall

Gambling machines operated to dispense beer—when the lucky checks come—will be banned from Marion county, District Attorney W. H. Trindle said yesterday. These machines have appeared this week in Salem and other Marion county places. Well over 100 such machines have been set up in the county.

City Attorney Kowitz and Chief of Police Frank Minto also added their avowal that such machines would be banned. Legal sale of beer does not carry with it legalization of such methods of increasing beer consumption, officials agree.

Machines found to be in operation include nickel, dime and even 25-cent ones.

GEARIN FREED OF LARCENY CHARGE

Dewey C. Gearin, held on a larceny by bailee charge involving 19 head of cattle and offspring, was released following preliminary hearing in justice court yesterday. Judge Miller Hayden held from the evidence submitted that if any crime had been committed, it had been in Multnomah county and thus his court did not have jurisdiction.

Hayden indicated at one point that the matter looked like one for civil procedure. C. O. Hjermstad of Portland, complaining witness, claimed that Gearin refused to make settlement for 19 head of cattle. Gearin held that the cattle were misrepresented and that for several years he had to make an accounting for them. Gearin claimed-

ed the cows were sold to him as abortion-free and registered stock, but that within three months after he added them to his herd the Gearin herd lost its government certified standing. Hjermstad testified Gearin had never made claim to him that the stock was not as represented, and as evidence submitted a note on the cows for more than \$2000, signed by Gearin nearly seven years after the original deal had been made.

Red-Head Event At Taft Starts

The annual Red-Head Round-up staged by the Taft chamber of commerce will be held today and Sunday. Officials anticipate one of the largest registrations yet. A program of water sports will be an especial feature. It is expected the roundup events will be filmed for a news reel service.

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
