Van Winkle Rules — The Pendleton sub-station of the Pacific Power & Light company is subject to inspection by the state labor commissioner on the basis of a fee of \$2. Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Monday. The opinion was requested by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner. Attorney General Van Winkle held that the sub-station is not a part of the main plant of the company.

Laborers Protest — Protests that Marion county laborers have not received recognition by contractors who are improving the Pacific highway between Brooks and Aurora were filed here Monday. The contractors alleged that Marion county citizens have been given the preference, although it has been necessary to import some of the skilled workers from other sections of the state.

Cannot Pay Warrants — The state treasurer is not authorized to pay, upon presentation, warrants for refund of gasoline taxes that have not first been registered and indorsed "not paid for want of funds." Jordan is now in the state penitentiary. The supreme court is now on its vacation but will resume hearing of cases September 6.

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BEER MACHINERY IS ON HIGH SEAS

Work on Brewery Here is Progressing; Capital Setup Revealed

Brewing machinery from Germany for the Salem Brewery association is now on the seas "somewhere between the Panama canal and Portland," local officials of the plant said Monday. The vats for the new plant are practically installed and placing of the brewing machinery will follow immediately upon its arrival here. Operation of the new brewery is expected to start sometime in October.

According to the directors of the new corporation, the initial capacity of the brewery here will be 30,000 barrels annually. Kola Neis is president, R. H. Wood, director; Frank T. Schmidt, technician and brewmaster, of the new concern.

The capital setup of the new company, as shown by the Oregon Voter, is:

First mortgage 6 per cent bonds, \$10,000 due three, four, five years from date, \$30,000; preferred stock, convert, 6 per cent, \$1 par, \$75,000; common stock, \$50,000; total, \$155,000.

When the present corporation began negotiations to obtain title to the building there were outstanding against it \$225,000 of mortgage bonds. Through foreclosure proceedings and various security deals, the building and land were obtained at a cost much below present appraisal on the books at \$102,637.

Judge Hunt May Be Honored For N. Santiam Work

An effort to gain consent from the proper governmental forest service authorities for placing the name of the late Judge J. H. Hunt on one of the new North Santiam highway bridges was revealed yesterday. It was hoped that the name might be placed on the White-water bridge, contract for which may be let by the highway commission on August 24.

While he was county judge, Hunt was an active proponent of the North Santiam highway project. He had dreamed of such a road while still a lad on a farm near Shaw. Although his efforts for a long time appeared futile, Judge Hunt remained confident that the road of his dream would be built in a few years. Construction of the highway was started shortly before Hunt's death.

Crash on State — Cars driven by Philip T. Anderregg, 670 South street, and F. T. Dick, 645 Norway, collided yesterday at the intersection of State and High streets. Dick's car hit Anderregg's on the right rear wheel and swung it half around, according to Anderregg.

Mrs. Brown Wins Judgment — Emma Murphy Brown was awarded a judgment for \$206 and costs in a decree handed down Monday in circuit court against John U. Plank and others.

Estate \$770 in Cash — The estate of the late J. F. Gieswein had assets consisting of a bank account at Woodburn totalling \$770, Fred Gieswein, administrator, reported in probate court yesterday.

Case Dismissed — Case of Louisa DeGulre against Maggie and J. A. Francis was settled out of court yesterday by stipulation between the parties.

Fined for Recklessness — John Couerhelt of Hood River, and Marilyn Wenger of Silverton were each fined \$5 in police court Monday for reckless driving.

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Last Excursion To Old Frigate To be Saturday

Offering local residents their last opportunity to see the historic frigate "Old Ironsides," Southern Pacific will operate another excursion to Portland, Saturday, August 19, A. F. Noth, local ticket agent, announced yesterday. The famous old vessel is scheduled to leave Portland August 22.

The same fares of 45 cents round trip for children and 85 cents for adults will again be offered, Noth said, and special train will operate on approximately the same schedule, leaving here at 9:20 a. m. and arriving in Portland at 11:30. For the return a train will leave Portland at 7:15 or tickets will be honored on any regular train arriving here by midnight, Monday, August 21.

Bicycle Traffic Regulations due At 1935 Session

Regulation of bicycles will be one of the traffic problems presented to the 1934 legislature officials declared Saturday. These are not motor vehicles and are not regulated by state law at the present time.

Officials said the bicycle had become a traffic problem, and that some regulation would have to be provided.

MERCHANT IS SUED FOR DIVORCE HERE

Lyllis F. Price Complains Of Cruel Treatment, Alleges Fraud

Mrs. Lyllis F. Price yesterday filed suit for divorce in circuit court here from Oscar E. Price, her husband, a local merchant. Plaintiff asked \$1000 support and suit money during the pendency of the case.

Plaintiff asks that a deed of trust transferring defendant's personal property to the Ladd & Bush Trust company be set aside as fraudulent. She alleges the deed was made the day before their wedding, February 22, 1930, but was not recorded until February 24, 1930. She also alleges that a reconciliation agreement and property settlement made in June of this year is not binding upon her because she was not represented by counsel and did not read the instrument. She asks that it be set aside. One-third interest in all real property owned by defendant is asked by plaintiff as well as support money. She alleges the value of defendant's business here is \$40,000.

Among the allegations made by Mrs. Price are the following: That defendant insisted they live in property she owned before her marriage and had trusted to her children so he could receive in-

come from his own; that defendant asserted he attended church, as did others, for commercial reasons; that defendant made claims for goods he did not possess in settling on a burglary insurance policy; that he unjustly injured the credit of a young business man; that plaintiff's criticism of defendant's course angered him greatly; that when plaintiff did not concur in a proposed business deal defendant said "as long as she was getting three meals a day she had no right to question how they were obtained"; that Mr. Price condoned mistreatment of his wife by his two sons; that on December 25, 1932, he pushed her into a doorjamb, so seriously injuring plaintiff she was under doctor's care for five weeks; that during a separation period lasting from February 4, 1933, to June 4, 1933, defendant did not support plaintiff; that July 18, 1933, defendant "set upon and brutally beat plaintiff, breaking her glasses and maltreating her to the extent that she became very ill and so remains."

In addition to suit and support money, one-third interest in all defendant's real estate, proper permanent support money and a decree of divorce, Mrs. Price asks that her former name of Lyllis F. Kapphahn be restored to her by the court.

Forfeit Bail — Anton Newell, Portland, and John Larson, Salem, each forfeited \$10 bail for not appearing in police court Monday morning. Newell had been arrested for reckless driving, and Larson for drunkenness.

HOF BRAU WILL BE ENLARGED, IS PLAN

So well has business gone at the newly established Hof Brau at the Marion hotel, South Commercial street, that Manager Joe Herman this week has decided to add to the shop by including the 24 by 24-foot room just south of the present Hof Brau.
