Add Road Project—The state highway commission today added the improvement of approximately five and one-half miles of the old Klamath-Crocker river section of the Dalles-California and Trater Lake highways to the list of projects to be considered at a meeting of the commission to be held in Portland August 24 and 25. Specifications for this improvement call for an oil mat surface. Jobs to be awarded at the August meeting of the commission will aggregate an expenditure of \$1,250,000.

GOOD GOVERNMENT CONTINGENT GROWS

Ex-Judge Earl Fehl is Sixth Jackson County man at State Penitentiary

The sixth member of the Jackson county Good Government congress yesterday morning became just another number at the state penitentiary, when former County Judge Earl Fehl of Medford arrived to serve a four-year sentence for ballot theft. Fehl will be a member of the hog crew.

Deputy Sheriff Dale Matoon of Klamath county brought Fehl to the prison, Fehl having been convicted in Klamath county on a charge of venue. Fehl was said to be the chief leader of the Good Government congress, of which L. A. Banks, who was dressed in Monday on life sentence for murder of Constable George Prescott, was also a leading light. Fehl, like Banks, was a publisher. His paper was the weekly Pacific Record-Herald at Medford, a publication which was aligned with the Banks' interests.

Besides Fehl and Banks, other Good Government "congressmen" in prison here under recent sentences are: Arthur Ladieu, four years; Thomas Broadhead, 18 months; Wesley McKittick, one year; Walter Jones, four years. Former Sheriff Gordon Schermhorn of Jackson county, sentenced to three years, has not yet been brought to Salem.

Committee Here Seeks Fund for Relief of Jews

H. Shusterwitz, of the Capital Hardware and Furniture company has been appointed chairman of the local committee to raise funds in this city for the relief of German Jewry. A national organization has been formed with Felix M. Warburg as honorary chairman and Rabbi Joseph B. Wise chairman of the fund raising committee. An effort will be made to raise \$2,000,000 in this country.

According to word received by Mr. Shusterwitz there are 100,000 Jews in Germany who have already lost all opportunities to earn a living.

Demurrer Overruled—Judge Lewelling yesterday overruled demurrer of defendant in case of A. A. Schramm as banking superintendent vs. B. Albika. Demurrer claimed that the cause had been barred by the statute of limitations.

Chemeketans Enjoy Outing; All Who Start Hood Climb Reach Top; Crag Rats Help

CHEMEKETAN CAMP, Lost Lake, Aug. 15.—(Special)—The big climb of the annual outing, this ascent up the difficult north slope of Oregon's own incomparable Mt. Hood was achieved Sunday, August 12th, by 15 Chemeketans escorted by three Hood River Crag Rats.

Perfect climbing weather obtained, with visibility from the top extending from Rainier to the Sisters. Excellent guidance was generously furnished by William Shepherd, president ("Chief Sheek") of the Crag Rats, Kent Shoemaker and George Iams, with the line up the mountain ably led by our own Chemeketan, Richard Upjohn, whose efficiency won the unstinted praise of the Crag Rats' spokesman.

The climb this year up Cooper's Spur, skirting Elliott glacier, was more difficult than usual because ropes formerly anchored on the snow field had been removed except for a short distance from the top.

The descent was icy and, without excellent guidance and adequate equipment, would have proven hazardous. It required eight hours for the ascent, but the record stood 100 per cent, for all members reached the top.

An interesting three mile climb up Cooper's Spur past timber line was taken Sunday by the following Chemeketans: William M. Hamilton, Alice Hamilton, Reed Rowland, Jessie Starr, Marion Downs, Hume Downs, Betty Hamilton.

This party witnessed a beautiful spectacle in the early dawn. The sun floated up from behind the blue silhouetted horizon, tugging with color Hood, Adams, Rainier and Helens, and bathing valleys and lesser hillsides in a lovely morning haze.

Chemeketans, camped on beautiful Lost Lake with its foreground of verdant timber and its background towering snowy Hood, are finding enjoyment and thrills in the water, on the water and at the campfire by the water.

Individual aquatic honors go to Constance Smart and Flavia Downs, who successfully swam non-stop two and one-half miles the distance from Chemeketan camp to the far end of the lake and returning part of the way they combated stiff breeze. Time and distance were checked by Reed Rowland and Jessie Starr, who accompanied the swimmers in the camp's rowboat.

The joys of sailing have been made possible by Richard Wilcox of Mosier, neighboring camper. Evenings, what jolly campfires! Singing, games, and "Pop" Cray's character readings! And talk on the local flora given by Miss Eva Kirby, authority on botany and an enthusiastic member of our outing group.

Hikers at the annual summer Chemeketan encampment had two days of very enjoyable hiking in the Saw Tooth range, near Lost Lake.

The first day a party of 11 hikers left camp in the morning. They followed a blazed trail through some of Oregon's most beautiful timber. This timber trail was followed to the summit of the range.

The party, under the able guidance of W. M. Hamilton, then followed the hog-back of the range, climbing three peaks. These peaks offered a variety in trail making. One peak, the lowest and the most difficult, was scaled over steep, bare rock. Much of the rock was loose. To add excitement to the climb, the rocks were swarming with millions of very tenacious, large red ants.

The party found many deer tracks, saw one doe, found many yellow-jacket nests—a grand total of 20 stings—and had an excellent view of the rolling hills of the Columbia river valley, on both sides of the river.

The next day the party went back and climbed an additional peak in the range.

Early Friday morning a party of seven Chemeketans climbed to the top of Lost Lake mountain to see the sunrise. They arrived on top of the mountain at 4:45. The sun came up at 5:00. The hikers had an excellent view of five snow-capped mountains glistening in the color of the early morning sun.

Count George Hay Dubarry of Curry county, who recently lost both his hands through accidental discharge of a shotgun, stopped in Salem yesterday en route north. He is going to Portland or Seattle for further treatment.

Stopping in Salem Dubarry emphasized the serious need of a hospital in Curry county. Now there is no institution for proper care of patients in cases such as his.

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FRANK MORRISON CALLED BY DEATH

Retired Architect Native of Wisconsin; Funeral Will Be on Thursday

DALLAS, Aug. 15.—Frank H. Morrison, 79, retired architect, passed away at his home Monday evening following a four-weeks' illness. He was well known in the valley as an architect, having designed and built the junior high schools at Independence and Dallas as the Falls City high school building.

He was born in Jamesville, Wis., January 31, 1854, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Morrison. That summer the family moved to its old home at Sheridan, N. Y., where he spent his boyhood. He learned the carpenter trade and later studied architecture and became an architect and contractor, which profession he followed until his health began to fail 15 years ago.

April 19, 1877, he married Sarah Eliza York at Dunkirk, N. Y. They made their home in Forestville and Silver Creek, N. Y., until 1884 when they and their family moved to Eureka, Kansas. In May, 1888 they moved to Salem and three months later to Dallas where they have lived ever since. Mr. Morrison was a member of the Odd Fellows' lodge for more than 40 years and was prominent in lodge circles in this county.

Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Sarah Morrison; brothers, N. I. Morrison of Seilo and G. B. Morrison of Alameda, Cal.; daughters, Mrs. Edna S. Callahan, Mrs. Hallie B. Starr both of Portland, and Mrs. Ruth O. Good, Oswego; on son, Ralph Y. Morrison of Dallas; five grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday, from the Henkle & Thomas funeral parlors with Rev. George Bruce officiating. Members of the I. O. O. F. will be in charge of the graveside services. Interment in I. O. O. F. cemetery here.
