Valley Packing
Adjusts Wages,
Hours of Staff

Valley Packing company of Salem will begin operating under the national recovery act Monday, but the new adjustment of hours and wage scales will be retroactive to August 1. It was announced Wednesday. The NRA code for the meat packing industry has just been completed. The Institute of American Meat Packers, with which the local company is affiliated, was instrumental in drafting the code in its final form.

Employees in the processing work of the plant will be limited to a maximum of 40 hours per week instead of 45, and their wages will be increased by 10 or 12 percent. The present payroll of 60 employees will also be increased by at least 10; these new employees have already been hired.

Mrs. Bloom's husband is in poor health and unable to work; the couple is living on \$10 a month furnished by a public welfare agency.

Jack Tomlin pleaded guilty before Judge McMahon yesterday and was sentenced to two years in prison for burglary at the S. P. section house at Turner. Commitment was held up pending word from the warden at Folsom, Calif. prison, from which Tomlin is an escape. At Folsom, he went in as Joe Carr, on a 6 1/2 year term for burglary in a house.

Deputy Sheriff Newell Williams said last night that word from the warden at Folsom requested that Tomlin be prosecuted here. Whether or not he will be paroled here on the two-year sentence imposed yesterday will be determined later, probably sometime this week.

Gilbert Lindley, held in the county jail on a morals charge, will waive grand jury and appear before Judge McMahon sometime this morning.

The honor guest was Mrs. S. A. Judson, widow of Robert T. Judson, who was a son of the original, Lewis H. Judson, who with his family was a passenger on the famous Lusitania, called Mayflower of the Pacific, arriving at old Fort Vancouver on June 1, 1840, and carrying the largest missionary party that up to that time had left any port for a foreign land. The Lusitania carried the machinery for the saw and grist mills whose erection started the town of Salem.
