BONUS PAYMENT TO JULY 21 FAVORED

Bonds may be Sold Providing Funds for Bonus and October 1 Debts

Payment of cash bonuses to World war veterans whose applications have been received between September 27, 1932, and July 21 of this year, will be recommended to the World war veterans state aid commission by Jerrold Owen, secretary. It was reported here Thursday, there are approximately 100 of these applications on file, which aggregate \$20,000.

The commission halted payment of cash bonuses last September pending an opinion by the state supreme court. Since no suit has been filed and the attorney general ruled that such payment could be made until the constitutional provision was changed, Owen will ask that payment be made as soon as funds are available.

The voters of Oregon, at the special election July 21, repealed the provision for payment of cash bonuses and increased the rate of interest on loans to six per cent on an assessed valuation of 40 per cent for two years. Cessation of loans after July 1, 1933, also was approved by the voters. The commission previously loaned at the rate of four per cent on a valuation of 75 per cent.

At the next meeting of the commission the bond market will be considered with a view of selling a block of securities previously authorized with which to pay cash bonuses and to make loans for which a dozen applications are now on file.

The commission has unsold bonds of \$1,200,000 but has refused to sell them because of uncertain market conditions. In case the market is considered satisfactory, bonds in the amount of \$250,000 will be sold.

Of this amount more than half will be used to meet the \$1,000,000 payment of principal and interest on outstanding bonds due October 1, Owen declared.

HEARING SET FOR TREE FRUIT SETUP

A hearing will be held in Portland Tuesday, August 22, at which a proposed marketing agreement requested by the Northwest Fruit Industries, Inc., will be discussed. It was announced in a telegram received at the executive department here Thursday from Ammon McClellan, chief hearing clerk of the agricultural adjustment administration, with headquarters in Washington.

The proposed agreement would come under the agricultural adjustment act and relate to conditions, practices and proration of shipments in the fresh deciduous tree fruit industry in the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

The telegram indicated that an emergency exists in conditions deciduous tree fruits in these states.

Senator McNary was said to have been instrumental in obtaining the hearing which is of interest to a large number of fruit growers in Oregon and other northwest states.
