Airmail Connections Better—Changes effected yesterday in the Pacific coast airmail service make it possible for matter leaving Salem at 6:30 p. m. to connect with the night plane in Portland flying south instead of being held over for the morning southbound mail plane as formerly was the case. Morning mail coming to Portland by air from San Francisco arrives at Salem at 10 a. m. instead of noon under the new schedule.

County Must Pay—The Marion county court is required to pay the cost of shoe repair bills of indigent Marion county students at the state school for the deaf, Attorney General Van Winkle ruled in an opinion handed down Thursday. The state law provides that the cost of all clothing necessary for the comfort of indigent blind and deaf children shall be borne by the counties of which they are residents.
