Numerous bidders quickly came into the market at the limit but had no time to effect intending purchases including one order of a million bushels.

Disclosure of temporary absence of aggressive buying support appeared responsible for the Considerable selling collapse. done on resting orders was looked upon as owing to readjustment of the market position of various speculators, but was not of unusual volume. Profit-taking on the part of recent buyers of all grains was a contributing element of weakness with corn losing most of an early gain which for a while had lifted the corn market to but little short of the maximum permitted in one day and had hoisted other grains.

33 than shelled filberts. Filbert prices in this country will undoubtedly reflect the scarcity in these foreign countries, which means good news for Oregon growers. Prices on both walnuts and filberts took substantial boosts recently.
