PRUNE MARKET IN GERMANY QUESTION

Four-Cent Duty Upon Dried Fruit Is Answer If No Call Says Paulus

With harvest of Oregon prunes only a few weeks off, dried fruit dealers are growing somewhat uneasy over failure of usual early-season inquiries from German markets. So far, Paulus Brothers, one of the largest dealers in the northwest, has received no inquiry from German buyers, William Paulus said yesterday in commenting upon the unusually backward swing in this quarter.

A four-cent duty on dried prunes which Germany has imposed may be largely the answer, Paulus thinks, in case the market there is actually dead. The duty is new this year, or at least in that proportion. In past, a cent or a cent and a half duty has been the top.

The German market takes a large bulk of the Oregon dried prunes, and for the entire Pacific coast the export outlet totals around 80 per cent. Possibly a half of the Oregon dried prune crop goes to Germany, from where it is repacked in bags and resold. While the four-cent duty is so far held responsible for the full market, there is possibility that no sales on futures have come simply because Germany is sitting tight to watch present developments in this country.

The English market is quiet too, but presumably due to flights of the money market.

School Man Visits—Lewis J. Uhrhammer, new principal of the Turner school, was a business caller in Salem Monday. He comes to Turner from Brownsville.

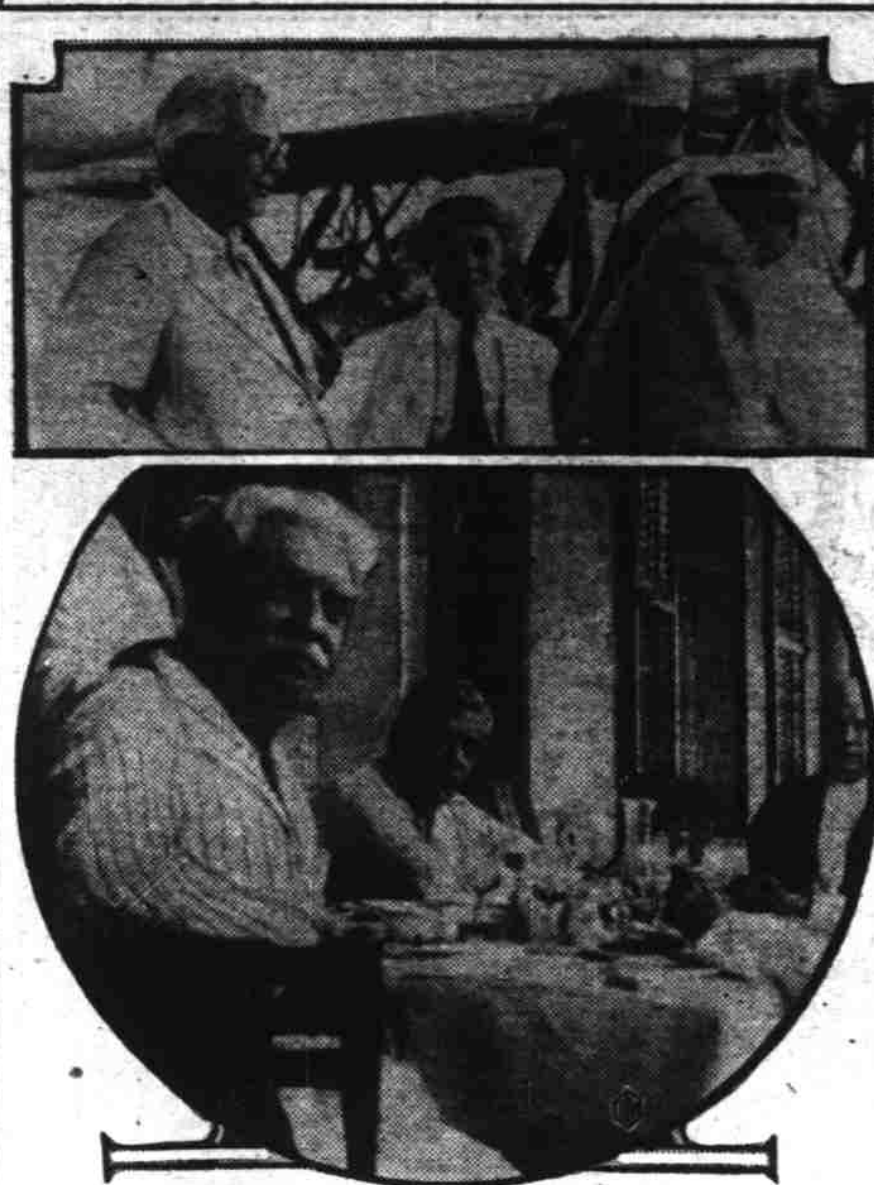

RICH GOLD STRIKE CAUSES STAMPEDE

RENO, Nev., Aug. 21—(AP)—Reports of a stampede to the scene of an asserted rich gold strike in the rugged mountains of northern Nevada, 60 miles northwest of Winnemucca, were received here today.

Prospectors and miners were declared rushing to the strike. Several mine operators and promoters left here to investigate.

The Reno Evening Gazette said a "grab" sample of ore from the strike assayed here showed \$1,975 in gold and \$305.50 in silver to the ton.

The strike was made by the Scossa brothers, James and Arnold, and their half-brother, Martin Gattavara, in the Jackson range mountains, which rise off the Black Rock desert. The range is some 15 miles long.

EINZIG REPORTS ON STATE FLAX SALES

Sales of state flax aggregating a value of more than \$35,000 were negotiated by William Einzig, state purchasing agent, while on his recent trip to New York city where he contacted a number of buyers.

Einzig made the trip at the request of the state board of control and visited several eastern flax manufacturing concerns. In addition to selling 100 tons of flax on hand for 17 cents a pound or about three cents more than was previously obtained, Einzig sold a carload of spinning tow and opened markets to dispose of the upholstery tow now on hand at the penitentiary.

The flax was sold to the Linen Thread company in New York and the spinning tow to a Boston firm, Einzig said. He also sent flax samples to a cigarette paper manufacturer in an attempt to interest the company in using flax for papers. The company promised to give the flax a trial.

Einzig indicated that he would recommend to the board of control some important changes in the operation of the state flax plant. He refused to divulge what these would be.

GOSS TALKED FOR VACANCY ON BENCH

The name of John Goss, Marshfield attorney and state senator from Coos county, will be submitted to Governor Meier as a compromise appointment to the office of circuit judge of the second judicial district to succeed the late J. W. Hamilton. It was reported Monday. Friends of Goss were here conferring with officials.

Reports received here indicated that Senator Goss was in a receptive mood, and that he would be willing to locate permanently at Roseburg.

Other persons mentioned prominently in connection with the appointment include B. L. Eddy, ex-state senator of Douglas county; Carl Wimberly, Roseburg attorney; and Dexter Rice, Rice previously served as county judge of Douglas county.

Governor Meier has not yet given any intimation as to when the appointment will be announced.

FORM FOR OLD AGE RELIEF REQUESTED

The state board of control Monday sent a letter to Attorney General Van Winkle requesting him to approve a form of application for persons applying for relief under the old age pension law enacted by the last legislature. The law becomes effective January 1, 1934.

The law provides that all applications shall be filed with the county courts and later be audited by the board of control. Officials said the average pension would be \$25 a month, based on the experience of other states in administering a similar act.

County Judge Siegmund declared today that the law probably would cost Marion county \$100,000 a year.

Two Suits Filed Here, Result of Fatal Accident

Two damage suits for \$10,000 each were filed in circuit court here yesterday against the Silver Wheel Motor Freight, Inc., and Henry Kunz, as result of the fatal accident last July 22 in which Robert and John Atherton Mead, youngsters, were killed.

Harrison Morton Mead, administrator of estates of the two children, is plaintiff in the suits.

SEATTLE, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Sweeping changes in the machinery of prohibition enforcement in the Pacific northwest, including the removal of district headquarters from Seattle to Portland, the reduction of personnel and the closing of prohibition offices in smaller Washington cities, were announced today.

The plans were revealed by Earl E. Koehler, former assistant special agent of the prohibition department at San Francisco, who today assumed charge of the northwest district.

L. O. Shirley of Seattle, acting administrator of the former district, becomes a field investigator, and Deputy Administrators Thomas C. Murphy, in Spokane, and W. H. Kinnaird, in Portland, will remain in the service.
