Fox at Oregon State college. Culling on a definite, recognized plan is a means of weeding out the low, unprofitable producers. It will not take the place of sound management, good breeding, proper dimase control, suitable housing, etc., says the bulletin. It is not a cure-all for the evils that have gone before. In fact the degree of culling necessary or the percentage of culls may be an indication of faulty management.

In the bulletin Professor Fox discusses when to cull, points in culling, and convenient practices really should start with "the parents of the present flock," and then adds that it is more or less or June and again in August. This illustrated bulletin is free
