GRAINS TURN SHARPLY DOWNWA LOCAL TOMATOES COME ON MARKET

Wheat Leads With Salem Markets
Drop Over 3 Cents; Salem Markets Market Thin

CHICAGO, Aug. 24-(AP) -Grains turned sharply downward late today, led by wheat with a tumble of more than three cents a bushel from early top levels.

There was nothing to account for the late selling wave except the market was thin and easily influenced. Weakness at Liverpool and reports of rains in Argentina were sufficient to pull prices down the opening, but a rally in stocks helped grains back up to yesterday's close before the new recessions carried prices lower than before. Much of the season found the pits idle.

Wheat closed weak at approximately the lowest level reached and 2% to 2% cents lower than yesterday's finish, corn also weak and 1% to 2% down, oats %-%

Confined to Salem, Amity, Roseburg: Season Late For Italian Prunes

Pre-season sales of prunes, limted so far largely to Roseburg, Salem and Amity, carry prices of from \$14 to \$15 per ton as a top for fresh prunes, according to the best information. Considerable stock has been purchased at a lower figure, from \$11 to \$12 per on, and in some cases contracts provide for dockage on scab and netting, while others specify acceptance of straight orchard run.

Production in this immediate area is extremely light, while the harvest will apparently be heavier in southern Oregon in proportion to the distance south of Albany. Quality promises some difficulty due to widely scattered scab and russetting in practically all the districts. Thus far, insect and brown-rot infestation is very light, and now the only real fear of growers is rain after the first of the month The northwest dried prune crop will probably be about the same
