SILVERTON, Aug. 24.—The Silverton Smith-Hughes department received 14 samples of corn, wheat, oats and barley this week from the federal grain inspection division of U. S. D. A. of Portland. The samples will be used in the laboratory work of the department. They contain test specimens of poor, damaged, highly damaged and exceptionally good grain. This will acquaint the boys with the various types of grain and how grain should look when it is in good condition.

The local Smith-Hughes department will cooperate with H. A. Lindgren in the wheat control work in this section. Warren E.
