OFFICIALS HERE MONDAY

Governor Meier telephoned from Portland that he will arrive in Salem Monday to attend meetings of the state board of control and state banking board. The governor has been spending the past two weeks at Gearhart and Portland.

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, also was expected to return to Salem Monday.

LEGISLATORS HERE CHARY ON SESSION

Opinions on the proposed special session of the legislature vary among senators and representatives now in Salem. Some are in favor of one immediately, some in the future, and some not at all if a constructive program is not assured.

Mrs. Hannah Martin, state representative, believes a special session advisable but is determined to dig out the facts for herself before agreeing to any relief measure. In other words, she will not pledge herself to any program before the session opens.

Mrs. Martin is not in favor of raising the tax on real property but neither does she believe in a sales tax.

Carle Abrams, state representative, hopes for such a successful re-employment campaign through the NRA that a special session will not be necessary. However, if relief funds are found necessary, he favors a special session later which could consider the liquor control problem as well. He is opposed to the sales tax and favors relief by employment rather than a dole or charity. Mr. Abrams would not object to a tax on luxuries or a bond issue to raise relief funds.

Senator C. K. Spaulding can see no immediate need for a special session but favors calling one late in the fall or early next spring after the 36 states have repealed the 18th amendment.

Otto K. Paulus, state representative, is in favor of calling the session soon to consider measures regulating the liquor traffic, correcting defects in the motor transportation act and providing funds for unemployment relief. He also favors a tax on luxuries as a means of raising these funds.

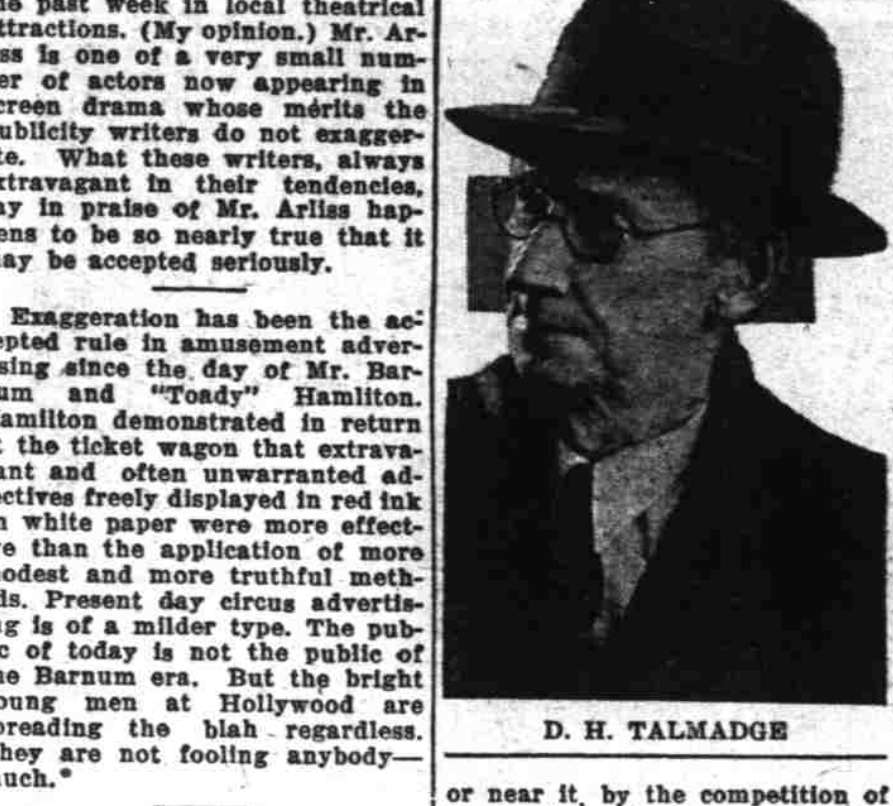
Senator Sam Brown approves of a special session only if a constructive program is assured the legislators before they convene. If for the purpose of promoting the sales tax, he is unalterably opposed to it. Senator Brown favors a relief measure which will tax those best able to bear the burden.

Romeo Gouley, state representative, could not be reached for an opinion late yesterday.

Publicity Men Fool Few Folks; Opinion-Clashes Off Opportune

George Arliss, in "The Affairs of Voltaire," was the highlight of the past week in local theatrical attractions. (My opinion.) Mr. Arliss is one of a very small number of actors now appearing in screen drama whose merits the publicity writers do not exaggerate. What these writers, always extravagant in their tendencies, say in praise of Mr. Arliss happens to be so nearly true that it may be accepted seriously.

Exaggeration has been the accepted rule in amusement advertising since the day of Mr. Barnum and "Rodey" Hamilton. Hamilton demonstrated in return at the ticket wagon that extravagant and often unwarranted adjectives freely displayed in red ink on white paper were more effective than the application of more modest and more truthful methods. Present day circus advertising is of a milder type. The public of today is not the public of the Barnum era. But the bright young men at Hollywood are spreading the blarney regardless. They are not fooling anybody—much.

I reckon we have had in Salem during the past year fully 25 of the "greatest" entertainments in the history of the world. I may be mistaken, but it appears to me that a certain amount of back-fire is bound to result from this. At any rate, I knew of dozens of people who ask somebody who has already taken a chance, or who has seen the show on a pass, before they plunge up the hard-earned dough at the box office.

Another Salem youngster has been in the headlines this week because of outstanding achievement. Winfield Needham, whom the Oregonian refers to as "the Multnomah club star" won the five-mile marathon swim in the Columbia river Sunday. Time, 1 hour 4 minutes 55 seconds. The previous record was 1 hour 13 minutes and 40 seconds, set by McCall of Vancouver in 1930. Okay, Winfield!

Few of us ever lose interest in the achievement or lack of achievement of individuals with whom we have a personal acquaintance. It is true in all lines of endeavor. It is particularly true in athletics and in music. Speaking of music, in every city in the country, including Salem, musicians totalling thousands have been forced into the bread line.

MEET WILL DRAW TRUCKERS OF STATE

Truck law litigation and NRA code for the trucking business will be the twin topics of chief consideration at a meeting of Truck Owners and Farmers association which convenes at two o'clock Monday afternoon at the chamber of commerce on call of the president, A. C. Anderson. From two to four representatives from each of the 25 county units are expected. An evening session will probably be held. There will be a discussion of mileage fees which should be paid to the state. This is the organization which initiated the suit by which portions of the law respecting contract haulers were declared unconstitutional by Judge Lewelling.

Rest of Bridges Will Come Later

J. M. Devers, highway commission attorney will submit final papers to the public works engineer's office for the Waldport bridge on which approval has already been had from the local office. This bridge will go forward in the first batch of projects approved by Engineer C. C. Hockley to Washington for final authorization.

"Hockley said he hoped to get the other four bridges, or at least three of them, in the second batch of projects which will be made up in the next 30 days," said Devers last night.

Silverton Has First Hophouse Fire of Season

SILVERTON, Aug. 26.—Igniting from the hot kiln just fired for the first time of the season, one of the three large hophouses on the farm of Mrs. Julius Wolfe two miles south of here was completely destroyed by fire today and the other two were saved only by the strenuous efforts of the Silverton fire department. The burned building was partially covered by insurance. Mrs. Wolfe, who refused to estimate its value, said tonight.

Located near the creek the two nearby hophouses were in a position to be thoroughly soaked by firemen called from Silverton at 4 o'clock this afternoon. By 6:30 p. m. the fire had died down to embers and danger of spreading with the wind was thought to be past. None of the buildings held any hops yet.

Today's blaze was the first fire of any proportions here since the middle of June.

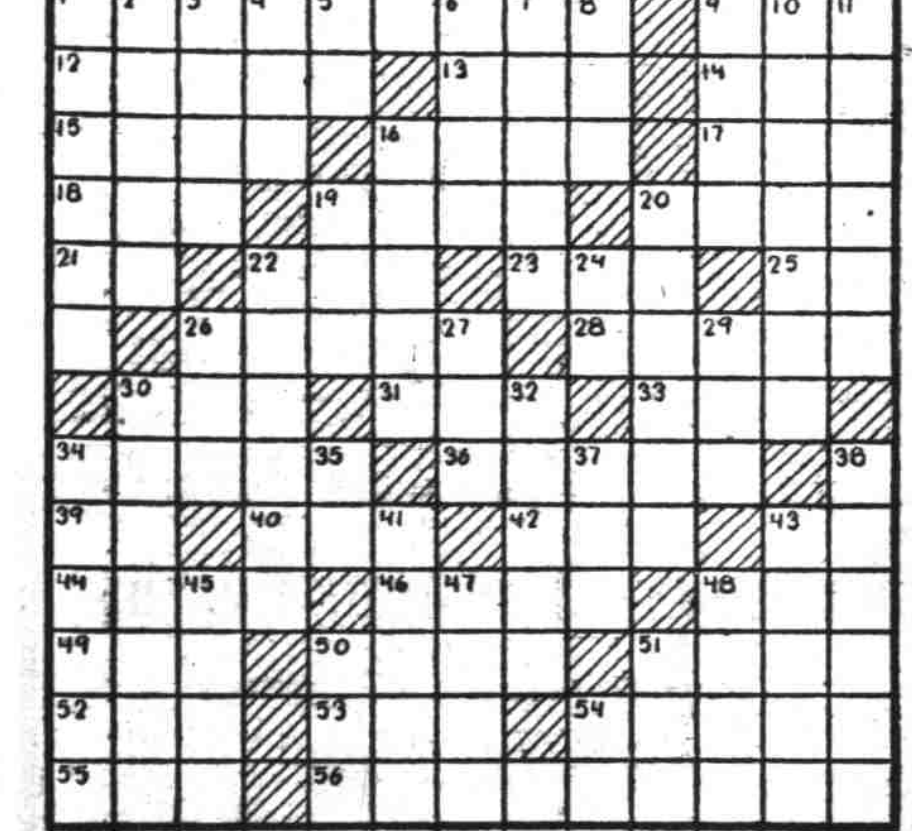
New Lumber Code Filed at Statesman

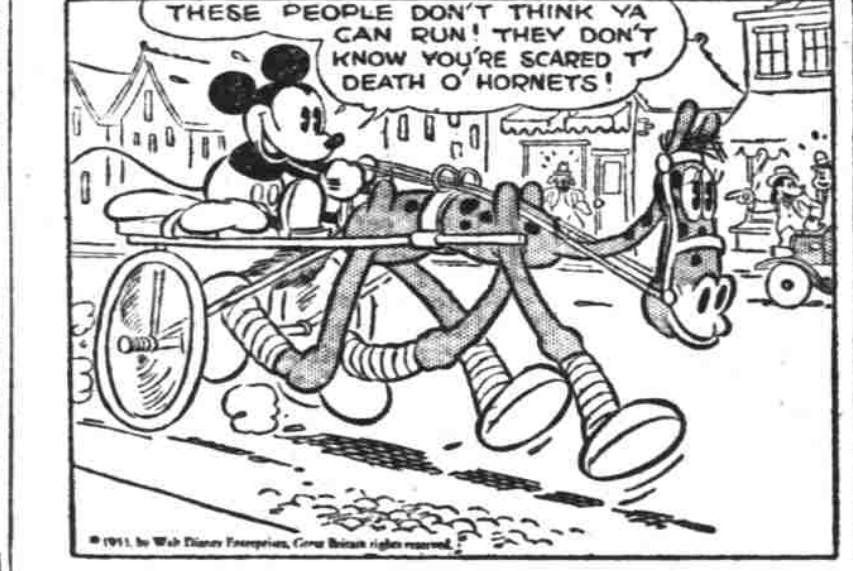
Cross-Word Puzzle

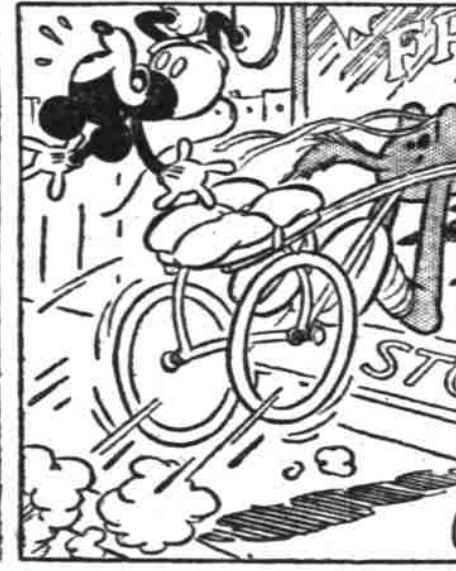
