Hop Growers Near Aurora See '34 Top

AURORA, Aug. 28—With threshing of a bumper crop of spring grain almost over, attention is being turned to the hop crop, the money crop of the valley. Picking of the early clusters and fuggles in this section will soon give way to the large crop of late hops, and Monday saw most of the yards in action. Spring rains, cool weather and plenty of moisture made good growing condition, that added to careful cultivation and spraying, in view of the attractive prices offered, assured the producer of profitable returns for his labor. The peak in price is not expected to be reached until next season, however by some experienced operators. Reports come from outlying districts that; a crop of oats on the ranch of Mrs. Dora Collins, out Mackburg way, ran 105 bushels to the acre; that hops are so heavy in the John Kester hop yard, they are breaking down the trellis wires; that wheat grown on swamp land by Collins Graham, down near the river, measured 6 ft. 4 in. in height.

STERLING WEAKER; GRAINS SLACK

GRAND ISLAND CANTS ARE DOWN 25c

Liverpool Wheat not Changed; Chicago Drops two Cents

CHICAGO, Aug. 28—(AP)—Grains moved slowly backward today, held back by an indifferent demand and weakness of the British pound sterling. Scattered selling was noted in the pits at the start of trading and with demand at a low ebb, prices declined around two cents a bushel in wheat. Liverpool wheat prices showed relatively little change, in British money, but were 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents lower in terms of dollars, due to a sharp drop in exchange rates. Corn was almost lifeless, following wheat but slightly and lacking any motive power on its own hook.

Wheat closed week and 1 1/4-1 1/2 cents below Saturday's finish, corn also weak and 3/4-1 cent down, oats were 3/4-1 cent off and provisions 3/4 cents lower.
