DOGS TO HAVE DAY AT OREGON'S FAIR

Salem Fanciers Will Exhibit, Including Keenan and Mrs. Hughey

The first real dog show ever held at an Oregon state fair will be held this year at the fair, opening next Monday. The Fair Kennel club, of which Drexel H. Brown, of Portland, is president, will stage the show, licensed under the rules and regulations of the American Kennel club.

Two Salem dog fanciers, Father Thomas V. Keenan and Mrs. C. M. Hughey, have been named as executive members of the bench show committee and will take an active part in the week's exhibition. Mrs. Hughey is prominent in state kennel club circles, being president of the Oregon Pekinese club.

Other Salem exhibitors will include Mrs. Louis Lachmund with wire-haired terriers; Roy (Spec) Keene, cokers, and E. T. B. Bill, English setters. Father Keenan will exhibit English setters, while Mrs. Hughey features Pekingeses.

An international wire-haired fox terrier champion, Ch. Challenger of Paignton Coats, will be at the state fair show. Challenger, owned and imported from England two years ago by Judge William Coats of Oregon City, is Oregon's only American champion male wire-haired terrier. The dog has won ribbons at the biggest shows all over the world.

Among the many valuable trophies offered to exhibitors is the grand sweepstake prize, a 19-inch cup, the C. M. Ryerson trophy. This prize goes to the best dog in the show.

Drs. M. Hoes and O. Ruehle, both of Portland, will be veterinarians for the show which will feature between 250 and 300 dogs.

She had always followed the old rule of 'Don't sign anything' and needed a few minutes reflection to realize that an NRA pledge card did not involve legal technicalities, but was merely a pledge to patronize the best of her ability Blue Eagle merchants," Mrs. Martin said.

The drive conducted by women volunteer workers ends Friday night. Its goal is a Blue Eagle in the window of every home in Salem.

Plaintiff Also Appeals Truck Law Decisions

Notice of appeal by A. C. Anderson, plaintiff in the 1933 truck law suit recently brought here against Charles M. Thomas, utilities commissioner, was filed by Anderson against defendant yesterday. Plaintiff as appellant, objects to Judge L. G. Lewelling's decision of 10 days ago in which he upheld certain sections of the 1933 code as being constitutional.

Thomas has already filed notice of appeal on the court's order which invalidates certain sections of the new law. Yesterday's appeal will bring before the supreme court the entire constitutionality of the truck legislation.

DeGuire, Mills Get Freedom in Divorce Courts

Two divorce decrees were granted here Tuesday by Judge L. G. Lewelling. Ruth DeGuire won a decree from Edward DeGuire whom she married several years ago. Her maiden name of

Ruth Singletary was restored by the court. Defendant was ordered to pay \$200 in alimony in \$10 a month installments.

Mabel Mills was granted a divorce from Joseph Mills whom she married in Vancouver, Wash., in 1927. She alleged that he harassed and annoyed her, used violence in her presence, swore at her and frequently stated he no longer cared for her. The court awarded her an acre of land formerly held jointly by plaintiff and defendant.

Guard Sends 300 Tents to Burned Area, Tillamook

Tents having accommodations for more than 300 civilian conservation corps members now fighting fires in Tillamook and Washington counties, yesterday were rushed from national guard headquarters here to the fire area. The tents were requested by Lynn Cronemiller, state forester, and the order was transmitted to the guard headquarters by the executive department.

Cronemiller declared that while showers had reduced the fire hazard a large number of men would be retained in the fire zone. He said the Wilson River fire was under control.

Time to Apply For License is Drawing Short

Approximately 8000 automobile drivers' licenses have been issued daily during the past week under the 1933 law providing that all motorists shall obtain new permits by September 1. It was announced Tuesday at the state department. There are 125,000 drivers yet to be licensed. Officials said that approximately 275,000 drivers have received their new permits, and that between 50,000

and 75,000 would be issued during the next two days. Drivers previously licensed are issued new permits without examination while applicants for their first license are examined.
