

## CHRISTMAS LIQUOR ASSURED, CLAIMED

12 More wet States Needed; 13 to Vote on Repeal By end of Year

SEATTLE, Aug. 30. (AP)—Washington's leap to the wet bandwagon gave it a push that will assure prohibition repeal before Christmas, national state repealists said today as mounting returns from Tuesday's election indicated the state returned only four dry delegates to 95 wets.

The total vote for wet and dry delegates late today, with 2684 precincts out of 2687 reporting, was wets 340,310, drys 141,857. The state voted by legislative districts, so the state-wide vote was only an indication of sentiment, but the wets apparently elected their delegates to the constitutional convention October 3 in every district but two, the ninth and tenth, composed of four agricultural counties, Whitman, Anotin, Garfield and Columbia, in eastern Washington.

H. C. Herberman, director of the wet campaign in Washington, said "nothing can stop repeal now. The drys had the advantage, because they were elected by legislative districts, and they were snowed under. The drys' forlorn hope was that Washington would stop the parade of states toward repeal and their hope was blasted."

Postmaster-General James A. Farley announced from the national capital that the vote of Washington, long regarded as "one of the outstanding bone dry states," now the 24th to vote repeal, makes certain his prediction that prohibition will be abolished "before the end of the year."

On or before November 7, 37 states will have voted on repeal. The wets need only 12 more states to win, the drys need 13 to block repeal. Vermont votes September 5; Maine, September 11; Maryland, Minnesota and Colorado, October 19; Utah, North Carolina, South Carolina, Pennsylvania and Ohio, November 7.

Herberman said today he was advised national wet leaders expected each of these states to vote repeal.

It was the first special state-wide election Washington has held since it became a state. Last November the state bone dry law was buried by a wet majority of 133,000. Totally dry since 1917, Washington was one of the earliest states to try the experiment of prohibition.

## COAL MINE REGION RULED BY MILITIA

GALLUP, N. M., Aug. 30. (AP)—This small city and its five coal mines were under martial law tonight as between 200 and 350 national guardsmen patrolled the streets and mines to protect property and prevent disorders during a strike called by the National Miners' union.

Approximately 900 of the 1000 miners in the camp are said to be supporting the union in its insistence on concessions from the mine operators. They seek, among other things, permission for miners to join any union they desire, the recognition of union committees and the right to elect committeemen without interference.

The proclamation of martial law issued by Governor Arthur Seligman at Santa Fe was followed by the entraining of national guardsmen at Albuquerque, Clovis and Roswell.

## Rains Interrupt Threshing Labors At West Stayton

## POLICEMAN SLAIN, YEGGS GET \$30,000

SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 30.—(AP)—One policeman was slain and another wounded seriously today in a swiftly executed \$30,000 bank messenger holdup which officials said might be a sequel to the William Hamm kidnapping in June.

Suspicion was directed toward the Tukey gang of Chicago after five bandits, their car's siren screaming and emitting a heavy black smoke from the rear, drove up to the postoffice, shot officers Leo Pavlak, 35, and John Yeaman, in front of the building and escaped in the smoke screen.

Pavlak was wounded fatally and Yeaman seriously as fire from sub-machine guns, shotguns and pistols swept the street and sidewalk, sending pedestrians scurrying and breaking windows in nearby stores.

The officers were accompanying two bank messengers, Joseph Hamilton and Herbert Cheyne, who had received a \$30,000 currency consignment from the federal reserve bank in Minneapolis. It was intended for a Swift and company payroll.

The company has insurance in force aggregating approximately one billion dollars, of which policies totalling \$4,000,000 are held in Oregon. Averill said he probably would advise Oregon policy holders to pay their premiums as they become due.

## PROBE OF FATAL WRECK LAUNCHED

TUCUMCARI, N. M., Aug. 30. (AP)—Two members of the New Mexico corporation commission came here today to join railroad officials and others in investigating the cause of the wreck early yesterday of the Golden State limited in a flooded arroyo with the loss of eight lives and injury to 42 persons.

J. D. Lamb, chairman of the commission, and Don Casados, another member, planned to conduct the inquiry with two railroad representatives and two disinterested persons.

Railroad officials expressed the opinion the trestle through which the engine and six cars plunged apparently had been undermined by a diversion of water against the east bank of the stream.

All the victims had been identified and those of the injured who were able to travel left by special trains.
