SEASONAL DULLNESS HITS STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Stocks dragged lower today in a rather uninteresting market. Trade statistics coming to hand at midweek served to emphasize the previously apparent seasonal contraction in industry. Mining shares, stimulated yesterday by President Roosevelt's gold order, appeared to have discounted the prospective improvement in earnings as a result of better selling prices; they met considerable profit-taking and finished with numerous losses of a point or so. Sales totaled 2,170,789 shares.

American Can, General Electric, American Telephone, Du Pont, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, National Biscuit, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, New York Central, Baltimore & Ohio, and Western Union were down 1 to 2. Allied Chemical reduced a loss of more than 5 points to 3 1/2. Home State Mining dropped 21 points, then rallied to close 6 lower.

Territory Wools Prices Advanced

BOSTON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—(U.S. Dept. Agr.)—Advances in prices of territory wools are being realized on the heavy turnover which includes all grades. Strictly combing 5, 5 1/2 blood territory wool has scored heads, high as 75 cents scored heads, the general range being 75-75 cents. Choice lines of 64s and finer territory wools in original bags have brought 78-80 cents scored basis for strictly and good French combing staple.
