Offers for fresh prunes have reached the \$20 per ton mark locally, some prune growers report. Canners are non-committal as to rice, merely indicating that a vide range of figures exist. A large quantity of prunes have been purchased at lower than the \$20 figure.

**\$20 PRUNE OFFERS** 

PORTLAND, Aug. 31 .- (AP)-The Journal said today that initial prices are being named on Oregon 1933 prunes, "but only in a few instances and in a limited way." "Values are somewhat higher than general sales a year ago," the article said. "No business can be confirmed although some is reported. California reports a steady business in sight with a rather fair volume to England. Prices there are perhaps a shade firmer but generally unchanged." Oregon 1933 prune prices are

quoted at 30-40s, 61/4c; 35-45s, %c; 40-50s, 6c; 50-60s, 5%c. "One of the features of the trade is the optimism expressed by the distributors," the Journal said, "in the face of the German duty boost which practically prohibits exports of American prunes, As Germany re-exports considerable of the prunes it usually buys from America, most of them going to Holland, Denmark, Poland, the Scandinavian countries and some to Belgium and France, the trade is going after this business direct."
