

Supreme Court Importuned in Case of Negro

More than 500 postal cards

have been received at the offices of the state supreme court, demanding that the conviction of Theodore Jordan, under death sentence for murder, be reversed. The cards were signed by members of the Oregon section of the

International Labor Defense league. Jordan was convicted of first degree murder in Klamath county in connection with the slaying of a Southern Pacific Pullman conductor. He is now in the state penitentiary pending disposal of his appeal.

The cards charge that Jordan was "framed" because he is a negro and was unemployed at the time the alleged murder was committed.

State Troopers Checking Driver Licenses, Word

State police yesterday started checking automobile operators to determine the identity of those who have not yet obtained new drivers' licenses under the 1933 law. The act provides that all automobile drivers shall have new permits by September 1.

Officials said that approximately 300,000 drivers had obtained their new license cards up until tonight. There are approximately 100,000 drivers yet to apply for their cards. Approximately 15,000 drivers' licenses were issued yesterday at the Salem and Portland offices.

FAMOUS HORSEMAN ARRIVES FOR FAIR

Jim McCleave, Colorful as Ever in Checkered Vest, Brings Noted Ponies

Rolling his r's with more Scotch twang than ever, Jim McCleave, colorful horseman, extraordinary of Stockton, Cal., was greeting old-time friends at the fairgrounds yesterday. McCleave arrived from the south Thursday. His string of 25 famous horses and ponies preceded him by one day and are now stabled in the stadium.

It's been 10 years since Jim McCleave exhibited any of his famous performers at a state fair and he is happy to be back. "It is just lyke comin' back 'ome agin," he explained in his best Scotch. At the same time he fondled the heavy gold watch chain which stretched across his chest, covered by a heavy plaid vest. Yes, Jim McCleave and his checkered vest are back!

Munching oats in their stables in the stadium is McCleave's string, under the ever-watchful eye of Jim McCleave, Jr., a tall Scot himself. And in their stalls were those two champions, "Diamond Jubilee," world's record high jumper with a leap of 8 feet 4 inches, and "Income Tax." The latter animal proved a surprise to all visitors yesterday afternoon, for he is just a pony but has a record leap of better than six feet.

Both performers are black as midnight. A few stalls further down was "Buttermilk," McCleave's trained driving horse, just a white as the other two stars are black.

All of McCleave's troupe are scheduled to take part in the two-hour Gymkhana in front of the grandstand each evening. Later, scattered with his high school educated horses will be competitive rodeo events, so horse lovers will get to see both types of animals in action.

Throughout fair week, McCleave, his horses and maidery will be on exhibition in the stadium building.

Calls for credit information have increased tremendously in the last three weeks, indicating that people are putting the old dollar into circulation in greater quantities than in months. LONGVIEW, Wash., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Forty tons of silver, valued at approximately \$1,488,000, was en route back to the Orient today and no one seems to know why.

The silver arrived Wednesday from China but was not landed. It was transferred to the steamship Golden Peak which cleared shortly afterward for the Orient. Steamship officers said they could not explain the about-face of the metal shipment.
