

THRASHING NEARLY DONE BEFORE RAIN

Convicts Help put out Only Blaze Which Threatens Grain Area

RICHEY, Aug. 31.—Thrashing in this community was practically finished before the rain. Saturday the thrashing outfit was at work here. The John Kinney machine of the Culver farm, which is being farmed by H. E. Martin, the H. Leiber machine from Bethel on the N. Fryslie and son farm and the Weigerwood outfit from Fruitland on the Hager farm.

The first thrashing was done here about a week earlier on the J. P. Lawritson farm by the Creech-Marchand thrasher. Grain yield was fair with some oats good. Some fields of wheat that were at first thought killed by the winter freeze went over 20 bushels to the acre.

Only one fire was reported during thrashing and but for the prompt action on the part of the thrashing crew, neighbors and about 50 convicts working, the whole neighborhood might have been on fire.

While thrashing was in progress on the Hager farm a spark from the engine flew into the bundles on the wagon of Michael Fitzpatrick, which was waiting to drive in to unload, and began to blaze. This frightened the team and they became unmanageable and ran away with the load of burning bundles and before being caught the wagon and wagon rack were completely destroyed.

The straw stack was completely destroyed and some grain was burned.

PEACH HARVEST STARTS DAYTON, Aug. 31.—Six local people are employed picking early Crawford peaches in the George Hessler orchard where picking began Wednesday morning. Other varieties of peach will follow the close of the early Crawford harvest. The prevailing price for first grade peaches is \$1.50 per bushel but in some orchards there are seconds for less.

Water Works Is Property of City at Last

MONMOUTH, Aug. 31.—Final payment has been made on a \$25,000 bonded indebtedness incurred 21 years ago, this being the cost of Monmouth's original water system.

So slowly was this debt liquidated that it became necessary a few years ago to levy a special extra charge of 50 cents on each water patron, bringing the cost of water to \$3 per month here, in order to create an additional means of paying off the debt.

In this way \$4000 for retirement purposes has entered the treasury since the water rate was raised.

Another Vote is Called on School Bus Proposition

AUMSVILLE, Aug. 31.—Because of technical errors in the last special election called to vote on transportation, another election will be held at the school house Saturday, September 2, at 2 p. m. to vote on transporting high school pupils from outside the district and those in the district that live a mile or more out. A survey indicates that very few students will be able to furnish their own transportation, and the four high school teachers have been given contracts.
