

MORE HOPEFUL OUTLOOK GIVEN

Acceptance of Salem Loan
Application by Boards
Is Cited by Kowitz

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Kowitz said he interpreted passage of the application by the finance division as a favorable sign and said he interpreted this to mean the fact that at least \$65,000 of the funds were to go for purchase of the plant here, would not interfere with the federal government's allotment of the funds. Previously Kowitz had been worried about the application when he learned the FWA had promulgated a rule that more than 15 per cent of the advance appropriated could go to purchase existing plants.

Funds for Engineer Work Authorized

The council by resolution authorized the state reconstruction advisory committee to set aside sufficient funds to do the preliminary engineering work needed for an application for a sewage disposal plant grant for Salem. If the plant is built from federal funds, these engineering funds are to be returned by the city to

the state board; otherwise the money will be a direct grant. Thus far no application for sewage disposal funds has been made by the city although a \$350,000 sewage plant bond issue was approved at a special city election July 21. Kowitz said he had been advised by the Reconstruction Finance corporation that the dock project loan application had been turned over by the corporation to the FWA.

The 51-page fire prevention and control ordinance was quickly voted down by the aldermen when the ordinance committee's report that the bill do not pass, carried by a 6 to 5 vote. The ordinance recently underwent severe criticism at a public hearing held at the city hall.

Will be Selected

City Attorney Kowitz said the fellow councilmen to have ready their appointments to the 1934 budget committee by the next session. Mayor Douglas McKay concurred in the request.

"Do we have to do that appointing all over again?" Alderman Henry Vandevort inquired. "Must we go on with that farce? I thought we had kicked that budget committee out; it never has amounted to anything. It's an insult to a man to be appointed on it. Year after year I have seen the committee appointed and nothing result; the council goes ahead and votes the budget it sees fit."

City Attorney Kowitz said the appointment and the meeting of a budget committee of 14 was required by law. Each alderman must select one citizen to the committee. Alderman Paul Hendricks inquired, when the budget matter was raised, what the status of his salary-raising, hour-reducing ordinance was. Alderman Watson Townsend, chairman of the ordinance committee where the Hendricks' resolution was referred, said his committee was not yet ready to report.

Hendricks moved and his resolution carried, that hereafter at each meeting of the council an up-to-date report be made to the aldermen on the progress of the city's negotiations for a water plant. Hendricks said aldermen needed the information to pass on to their constituents.

FAIR, HOP, PRUNE MEN DECRY RAINS

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growers, however, remained hopeful because the crop is late and cracking of fruit dependent upon further interspersed rain and sunshine.

Hop men said damage would be negligible if the rain stopped soon but would amount to \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 worth of hops if the showers were protracted. If the rain does not last long, it will have washed off the hops and improved picking; if it continues, it will breed the spider and result in mould which would cut the value of the crop.

Firemen felt relieved, since yesterday's rain was believed to have ended danger of serious grass fire for the remainder of the season.

TEXAS HURRICANE TOLL IS MOUNTING

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hurricane, the two Rio Grande valley cities of Brownsville and Harlingen lay prostrate tonight with buildings blasted to the ground, streets under water and all survivors in immediate need of assistance.

The casualties could not be reckoned but it was considered improbable that the violent disturbance could have passed through those communities without exacting a heavy toll. Indefinite and meager reports from towns on the edge of the devastated area told, however, of bodies lying on the highway between the cities. A newspaperman who made a trip from Brownsville to McAllen estimated 200 persons were injured. Property damage was tremendous, the loss to the citrus groves more than \$3,000,000.

Only the most substantial buildings were standing in Brownsville as the gale blew lesser structures away like chaff. Municipal water and light plants were put out of commission, telegraph and telephone lines were battered to the ground and highways were torn up.

J. F. Reed, assistant director of the Texas rehabilitation and relief commission, announced that Harry Hopkins, federal relief director, had authorized the purchase of groceries for the destitute.

About the same time, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson announced from the state capital at Austin that arrangements had been made

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of the rescuers, was pulled in and the door was locked.

Dr. Raymond F. C. Kieb, superintendent of the hospital, immediately began rounding up a force of guards, state troopers and sheriff's deputies to storm the ward.

Four of the inmates, who fled the ward, were trapped in a "day room" by the force of 40 officers or more hastily assembled. One of the men had a revolver, it was learned.

The guards were throwing tear gas into the room in an attempt to force the patients out.
