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banking assets will be followed in this reserve district. There will be coordination in the type of data rounded up on individual banks in the various states, and work will be expedited in similar ways to prevent an eleventh hour rush.

The size of the problem is indicated by the number of banks to be insured. There are about \$65 of them in the Twelfth district—with around \$3,382,000,000 in deposits. The district includes California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. On July 31 there were 758 banks operating under licenses without restrictions, while 107 were restricted, and about \$44,000,000 in deposits remained tied up from the bank holiday.

Out of the total of \$3,382,000,000 deposits, only about \$523,000,000 is in non-member banks. It is the examination of the assets behind these deposits that causes the most immediate concern.

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The American Bankers' association today drafted its war map to battle against insurance of deposits, and also announced a policy of cooperation with National Recovery by administering credit to industry and commerce "within the limits of sound banking."

Five thousand bankers attending the association's convention adopted a resolution demanding postponement of the deposit guaranty act of 1933, already adopted by congress and slated to become law next January 1.

The association suggested in a resolution that a federal commission be appointed to consider in relation to one another "the vast and important problems of money and banking and central banking, that are pressing for solution and settlement."

"It is clearly true," the resolution said, "that this nation cannot indefinitely continue to carry on its business affairs with a monetary system in so unsettled a state as it is at present."

BLAME ENGINEER FOR ERIE WRECK

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Sept. 6. (AP)—Definite blame for the Erie railroad wreck, which killed 14 persons and injured scores, last night, was placed upon the engineer of the milk train tonight by H. J. Bordwell, general manager of the eastern division of the railroad.

"Engineer M. H. King is to blame and alone to blame," he declared in an interview with the Binghamton Sun. "He absolutely disregarded signals, rules, regulations, and about everything else."

The milk train with King at the throttle plowed into the Chicago-to-New York Atlantic express as it stopped on the eastern outskirts of the city last night.

U. S. MARINES AWAIT ORDERS

Pres. Roosevelt Tells Diplomats he Seeks to Avoid Intervention if Possible

The president emphasized to the representatives of Argentina, Brazil, Chile and Mexico who met with him and Secretary Hull at the White House late today the object of keeping them informed of the situation was that the United States believed their countries had just as much interest in the preservation of order in Cuba as did the United States.

HAVANA, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The new Cuban government tonight guaranteed order "in all the republic" as reports of scattered disorders reached the capital while American destroyers lay within gunshot of the island and others speeded in this direction.

The guarantee was conveyed in a manifesto which revealed that command of the armed forces soon will be returned to the heads of those organizations, whose non-commissioned officers and enlisted members participated in Monday night's coup which brought about the resignation of President Carlos Manuel de Cespedes and his cabinet.

Jose Izazuri, one of the five members of the executive commission which has taken over rule of the country, declared the government had no official information regarding the movement of U. S. marines, war boats or the arrival of the American secretary of the navy, Swanson, and hence he could not reveal the official government's attitude.

Equal representation was promised to each revolutionary faction as the "executive commission for the provisional government, comprising five of the leaders of

Machado in Montreal MONTEAL, Sept. 6.—(AP)—General Gerardo Machado, who sought haven in Montreal after insurrectionists ousted him as president of Cuba, is ill and has been ordered to stay indoors, it was revealed today.

Julius Brown, the former president's general factotum, announced his illness as several members of the general's family joined him, arriving by train from Philadelphia.

"He has been suffering from a slight kidney disorder which has been giving him some pain," Brown said.

Senora Alvirra Machado, his wife; their son-in-law, Dr. Baldo-mero Grau; their daughter and granddaughter arrived by train from Philadelphia. Fernando Fernandez, a business friend of Machado, accompanied the party.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—Governor James Rolph, Jr., ill since Saturday in St. Francis hospital here, was reported by his physicians today to be gaining in his battle against pneumonia despite a restless night.

"Unless conditions change for the worse, a situation we do not expect," Dr. John Galloway, the governor's personal physician said, "we believe he is safely on the road to recovery."
