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stepped from the witness chair to end the long grilling he had undergone. Deputy District Attorney Allan P. Lindsay, Charles M. OFFICERS OF BOAT HELD FOR MURDER

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 7.—(AP)—James Ford and J. L. Costello, first officer and master-at-arms, respectively of the pleasure boat City of Panama, were arrested tonight on federal warrants charging them with murder in connection with the death of Robert L. Moody, former Seattle resident. Moody was beaten to death aboard the ship last week.
The warrants were secured by Van Fleet Palmer, acting U. S. attorney, on evidence obtained by department of investigation agents and the combined forces of the Los Angeles and Santa Monica police departments. Costello was jailed in Santa Monica and Ford was held in San Pedro.
Moody, accompanied by two young women and another man, boarded the craft for a cruise beyond the 13 mile limit. Members of the boat's crew testified at a coroner's inquest that Moody became intoxicated after boarding the craft, and his friends claimed two seamen attacked him.

Beer Legal for Humans But Not For Dairy Cows

BOISE, Sept. 7.—(AP)—"Three point two" beer is legal for humans in Idaho but State Welfare Commissioner Lewis Williams ruled today that 3.2 mash is not legal for dairy cows.
Advised that a local dairy was feeding malt mash from a Boise brewery to its dairy herd, he pointed to the state law, which says:
"Milk shall be deemed to be adulterated in any one of the following cases: Milk drawn from animals fed on brewery or distillery waste, or any substance in a state of putrefaction or rotteness. . . . Such milk is forbidden to be sold."
He said there was no regulation against feeding the brewery mash to beef cattle.

END OF FURLONGS NO SURPRISE HERE

No official notice has been received by postal authorities here in regard to cessation of the furlough-without-pay system in vogue among most civil service employees. However, no surprise was expressed upon receipt of the news of the announcement made early this week by Postmaster General Farley to the national assembly of letter carriers at Atlantic City to the effect that payless furloughs would be a thing of the past after September 30.
Under the furlough system each postoffice employee has taken three days per month off from his regular schedule for the past three months without pay. Postmaster John H. Farrar estimated yesterday that this has brought about a cut of 10 per cent in the running expenses of the local office. Postal employees also received a genuine cut of 15 per cent in their salaries early this year making the total saving one of almost 25 per cent.
When the furloughs were begun, July 1, it was generally understood that they were to last only during the three summer months unless additional need for frugality were noted meanwhile. Farley told assembled carriers that an increase in postal receipts had been noted recently.

HOPE FOR MISSING CLIMBERS WAVING

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the search today when the Portland post, American Legion, secured the services of an army plane and pilot from Vancouver barracks while the advertising club guaranteed expenses for the 20 searchers now combing the precipitous slopes of the snow-covered peak.
A track load of provisions has been rushed into Olallie lake, 10 miles from the mountain, where the searching parties have established a base. It was at this lake that an automobile that carried John Thomas, Davis McCamant and Don Burkhardt, the lost men, to the scene of their hiking expedition was found Tuesday.
Any tracks that may have been left by the trio were buried by fresh snow, a report from the base of search operations revealed today.
At dusk tonight, the first party of eight searchers that left here Tuesday were believed to be near the summit of the mountain, more than 10,000 feet high. Aviators flying over the district today, however, reported a ceiling of but 9000 feet and climbing veterans here believe that a blizzard that swept the mountain Monday and Tuesday may resume.
A second quota of searchers, 12 men, left this afternoon for the scene. All were experienced, having taken part in previous searches atop the mountains in this region.
The hope of finding the men alive, mountaineers said, was dimmed by the fact that great rock slides and snow avalanches were common at this time of year and may have engulfed the trio.

HOME LOAN PLANS FORMULATED HERE

When the creditor of the mortgagee agrees to accept government-backed bonds, the application is made through Mr. Bayne's office here. He in turn helps applicants with their preparation and as soon as possible forwards the application to Portland.
The Home Owners' Loan corporation is also authorized to loan in cash up to 40 per cent on homes on the provision that the borrower can get funds nowhere else and his loan at present is in default. The loan is to be made only in case of distress, Bayne says, and is not to be made to reduce interest for borrowers.
Under the terms of the home owners' loan, interest is to be repaid in 15 years.
Bankruptcy for Trimble's Firm Sought by Bank
SEATTLE, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The First National bank today filed an involuntary petition in bankruptcy in federal court against the Trimble company, Inc., a holding company, headed by William Pitt Trimble, a leading Pacific northwest capitalist.
The petition asserted that the company is insolvent, and that within the past four months it has committed four acts of bankruptcy.
William Pitt Trimble, Jr., one of the directors, denied that the company was bankrupt and asserted his belief that the bank could not make the petition "stick."

Gibbard 1-Man Postal Staff at The Fairgrounds

Considerable mail is taken care of daily by the one-man postoffice at the state fairgrounds.
A. E. Gibbard, Salem assistant postmaster, is the one man. Between 9 a. m. and 1 p. m., and from 5 p. m. to 7 p. m. he is a clerk, selling postal cards over the counter, accepting and cancelling mail, sending out mails to the trains, registering letters and doing all of the thousand and one things that postal clerks do.
After and before hours he is carrier, delivering mail to persons quartered on the grounds. And all of the time, he is postmaster at the little station of which he is in charge. OBSTACLES TO OIL PRICE FIXING WILD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—(AP)—A sputtering bomb of non-cooperation that for a while threatened to prevent the full execution of the \$12,000,000,000 oil code apparently had been smothered, tonight only a few hours before the industry's great experiment in controlling oil production was to begin.
The flame that lighted the bomb was the report, first verified in high oil circles and then officially discounted, that W. S. Farris, board chairman of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, largest oil company in the world, had declined to cooperate with the planning and coordination committee of the oil industry, now at work here perfecting the oil code.
Farris replied to the report with a statement asserting "We stand ready to furnish any information or facts at our command to aid the petroleum committee or the federal agency in the administration of the code."
Meanwhile the oil industry sat back to watch the effect of the production allocation orders which go into effect tomorrow, reducing crude production by 350,000 barrels a day. Already price increases have been posted by major oil companies, and executives were confident that further rises would carry crude at least to the dollar mark, while gasoline would advance from one to three cents.

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supply the remainder. The minority fund would expect provision of \$5,300,000 by the state, \$2,360,000 from the federal relief fund and \$375,000 from counties.
Likelihood that a majority and minority report would be turned in to the full relief group was seen because of the variance in views. In lieu of this, however, the probably approved that a general report signed by the full committee may be filed, setting forth the relief program which might be supported by each sum and the opinions of members on the subject.
A meeting to formulate the report is to be held Monday at the offices of the relief committee here.
Advocating the larger amount was W. J. Rook, of the unemployed Citizens League and he was supported without reservation by Mrs. Nettie Rankin Bolland, president of the Portland federation of women's organizations. Frank Shull, Multnomah county commissioner, was inclined to support the proposal with an indication that he might compromise on \$10,000,000.
The two members advancing the smaller fund were Raymond E. Vileox, chairman of the state relief committee, and Elliott Corbett, chairman of the Multnomah county relief group.
All members agreed upon 27,000 families as an average relief load in the state.

Eric Ross, labor union official, who made the complaint in telegrams to Washington, was promptly branded as a radical by Ellery K. Files, vice-president and general manager of the Lea firm. Files told reporters the charges against the company were groundless.

GLACIER PRIEST IS HOME FROM NORTH

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Bringing new tales of adventure and valuable scientific data on the volcanic phenomena of the Aleutian Islands, Father Bernard R. Hubbard, famous as "the padre of the glaciers," returned today from his latest trip of exploration.
With two companions, Ken Chisholm of Santa Clara and Edgar Levin of Stanford university, Father Hubbard this year climbed and explored the craters of the Aleutian volcanoes Shishaldin and Akutan, 90 miles apart.
On Akutan, Father Hubbard related, the party discovered a boiling torrent of water running through banks of ice and snow, where they heated canned food in midstream and bathed in the lukewarm backwash.
The padre, head of the geology department of Santa Clara university, declared he had obtained confirmatory evidence that the Aleutian chain is gradually being joined to the Alaskan mainland by sand bars.
