

# SCIO COUNCIL EYES FUDGING ON WATER

## Budget Committee Named, To Meet With Aldermen On September 12

SCIO, Sept. 8.—Work on the galvanized reservoir for the Scio water system will be begun as soon as practicable, according to a report made at the September meeting of the town council. Nelson Bros. of Salem will take preliminary steps on the contract awarded by the city at a recent special meeting of the council.

A budget committee consisting of E. D. Myers, W. Z. Sims, Frank Bartle, Joe Lytle and P. W. Schunk was appointed with instructions to meet with the council September 12. A late state law requiring the preparation of the budget on November 1 instead of December 1, as heretofore, was referred to in a letter from the county assessor to the mayor, hence the earlier action by the council.

Reference to a water meter placed in a Scio business house some time ago and discontinued within a short time prompted the statement by Councilman Fred Bryan that "it would be a good thing if we had lots of meters," whereupon Councilman N. I. Morrison referred to an alleged case of "fudging" on the use of water for irrigation in which the home was said to have been attached in the bathroom and run out of the window for irrigation purposes.

"Enough water has been used during the 1933 irrigation season in Scio, if paid for according to a meter, to put the water system in fine repair and pay expenses and add much equipment," Bryan declared. Other members and the mayor commented on the situation, the mayor expressing the opinion that next year a satisfactory arrangement no doubt can be made with reference to the use of water for lawns, etc. Mayor Ewing reiterated a former official statement that he believed the irrigation period should be reduced from three to two hours twice daily.

"The city's electric power bills are higher when the pump is functioning at capacity to supply the irrigators who 'fudge' on the use of water, and meters in such cases would be economy for the town," Bryan interposed. It was noted that as the irrigation season is virtually over for this year there should be no further irregularities.
