# WALLACE DOERFLER WINS 4-H HONORS

**Homer Shelby, Melba Andrews, Janet Hinkle Also High in Club Work**

Wallace Doerfler of this county was honored yesterday at the state fair by being named one of two boys to receive highest honors in 4-H club contests. Homer Shelby of Linn county shared the honor with him. The two-4-H club girls to be similarly honored were Melba Andrews of Lane county and Janet Hinkle of Multnomah county.

In recognition of their achievement the young people last night were entertained at a dinner at the home of Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Lee Steiner, the former superintendent of the Oregon state hospital. Other guests at the dinner were H. C. Seymour, state club leader, and Mrs. W. A. Pettit, chaperone. Next summer these boys and girls will spend a week at Wallows lake lodge, with all expenses paid by a benefactor who requested that his name be withheld from publication.

Doerfler, 18, has been in club work for nine years. He entered this activity with a ewe lamb but now owns 25 head of Shropshire sheep. He has exhibited at the state fair and Pacific International Livestock exposition each year that he has been engaged in club work. His 1933 state fair winnings included first in the Valley Packing company hog special, first in pen of market hogs, first in hog showmanship, first in single fat hog, first in Cass Nichols Pure Jersey gilt special, third in Southdown fat lamb, fifth in Shropshire fat lamb, sixth on Shropshire ewe lamb and sixth on Shropshire ram lamb.

**Wins Many Honors**  
Young Doerfler placed high in both club and open classes at both the state fair and the Pacific International Livestock exposition, and was a member of the Marion county livestock judging teams three different years. He was the winner of a scholarship to the state college summer school seven of the nine years he has been in club work.

Homer Shelby has been engaged in club activities for seven years. He started in club work in 1926 with a purebred Poland China pig and now owns 10 registered brood sows and one boar. His winnings at this year's fair included first on Jersey cow, first on senior calf, first on Shropshire ewe lamb, first Shropshire ram lamb, first Poland China litter, second junior gilt, first fat barrow, first Valley Packing company special, third hog showmanship and first in Cass Nichols purebred Poland China gilt. Shelby also was selected as the outstanding 4-H club boy in his county and received a free trip to the state fair as an award.

Melba Andrews, 14, has been engaged in 4-H club activities for six years. During this time she has carried projects in handwork, canning, cooking, sewing, home-making, room improvement, forestry, marketing, poultry, rabbit and calf. She has earned, above the cost of production, approximately \$58. Miss Andrews has served as leader, assistant leader, president, vice-president and secretary of various clubs. At this year's state fair she placed first in the Kerr canning special, second in sewing demonstration.

Directors of the Salmon River Improvement district are anxious that the 1933 enactment funding their bonds through the state highway department, be carried to the supreme court, Ira Withrow of
