

# WARRANT DEBT ITEM STAYS IN

### Board Members Favor Plan Despite Protest Made By Citizens' Group

took issue, holding the move valid and advisable in view of the rising total of warrant indebtedness of the district, now about \$275,000.

Reputation of school bonds in preference to levying a tax to pay off warrants was Ex-Mayor P. M. Gregory's suggestion, while Director E. A. Bradfield pleaded for the levy as a means of protecting the district's credit.

On the motion to quash the warrant appropriation, the vote was: Aye—Dancy, Mrs. Keene, W. L. Phillips, G. F. Chambers and Dr. Olinger. Nay—Bradfield, Walter Minter, Dr. Pound, Mrs. David Wright, F. E. Neer and Gregory. The budget calls for a \$5,600 appropriation for health service, \$700 less than last year. This will not affect the county health department, however, as provision was made for this reduction a year ago, according to Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer.

An increase of \$28,405 is made in the present budget proposal over that drawn up last April, while Dr. Olinger and Mrs. Keene were on the board.

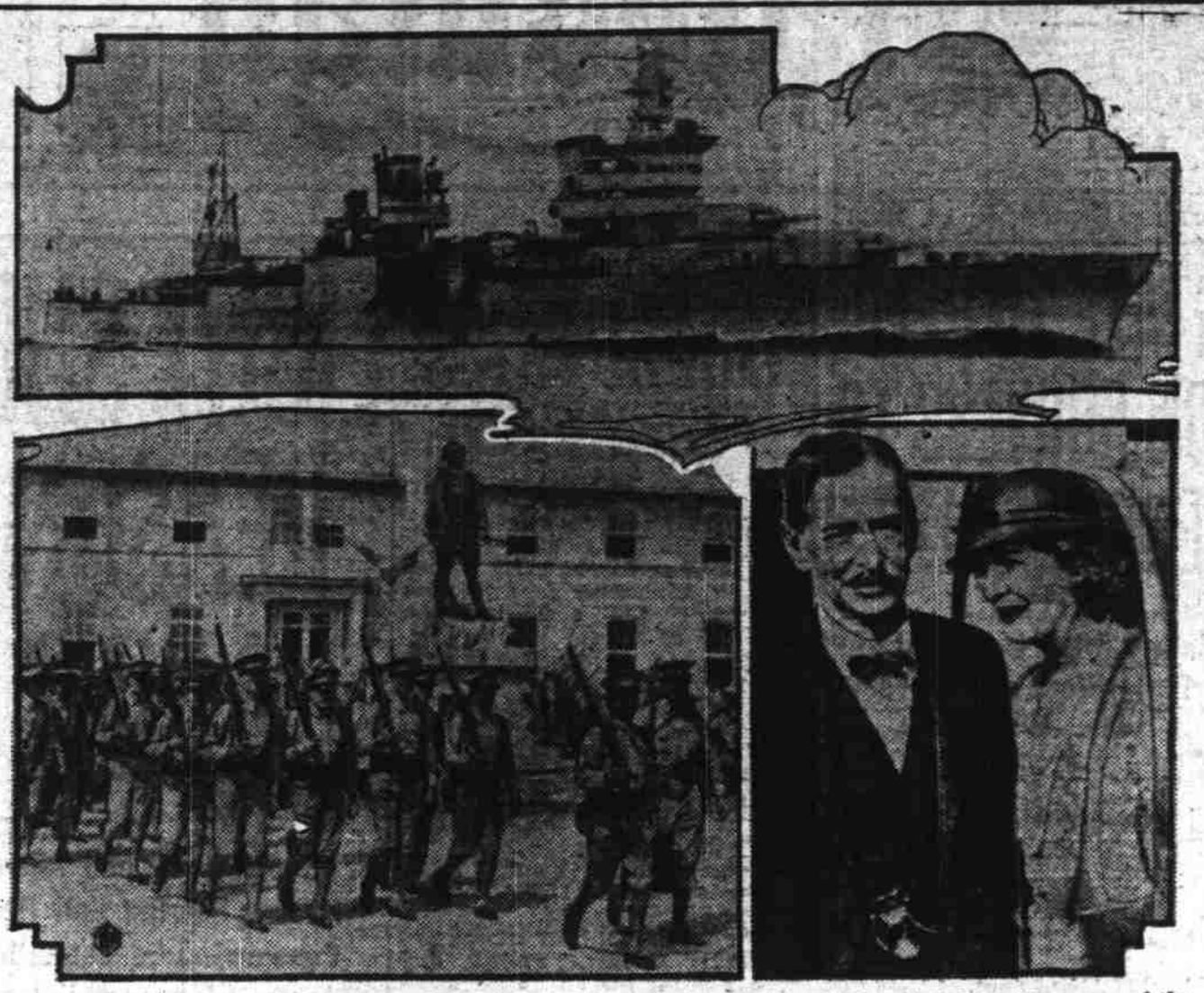

year ago last May would be in the high school this fall. Chairman F. E. Neer declared that all of the 45 were again affiliated with the societies and that he knew all former members of the J. C.'s, boys' society, were again active in that organization.

Director B. F. Pound brought out that the 1933 Clarion Annual had certain sections in effect devoted to secret society members and suggested pressure from state college and university fraternities as a method of driving out the secret societies in high schools.

Director Walter Minter contributed a plan of discouraging secret society affiliation among junior high school students, "getting started off with students coming in" and thus eliminating the societies "in a few years."

"I think it wise to make a thorough investigation again," Superintendent Hug declared. "Then we should make the principals and teachers feel we are right back of them in fighting the societies."

The secret society situation in Salem high schools goes back more than 20 years to organizations formed for such purposes as promoting interest in oratory, and later to organizations formed to combat other secret society activities in the school. During the last ten years, trouble has arisen in the schools regularly over student membership in the societies and over actions of these members.

# Veterans' Bonus Bonds Purchased By Chicago Firm

# LIGHT SHED ON COLLEGE AUDIT

### Kerr Advised Withholding It Least Legislature's Reaction Be Poor

with his audit findings, Hess' office reported.

According to Hess, Buell's initial report of irregularities was submitted to the secretary of state in February. The report was sent to Dr. W. J. Kerr but not to the board of higher education. Shortly thereafter Kerr and C. L. Starr, chairman of the board, conferred with Hess and Otto Kubin, in charge of the auditing department. The report was then turned over to W. A. Jensen, executive secretary to Chancellor Kerr at Corvallis.

The report released yesterday by Hess was compiled by Jensen. It does not include the full report made by Buell but portions of that report are cited. Jensen complied with the Buell remarks, refutation for each charge. Numerous veiled attacks on the auditor are contained in the 57-page document in which, in the main, the actions of Jackson who was criticized by Buell are fully defended.

Charges against Jackson include shortages in his inventory accounts, irregularities in handling accounts, burning of original records including those as late in date as June, 1932, use of college-paid workers to build a house for Jackson, and general laxity in the conduct of his business affairs. In Jensen's reply, statements from E. M. Smith of the business office at Corvallis, an extended affidavit from employees of the college under Jackson's direction.

Reference is made in excerpts from Buell's audit to "signed and sworn statements" in Buell's possession which allegedly confirm Jackson's irregularities. These statements are not included in Jensen's report nor were they available yesterday at the secretary of state's offices.

# SUNDAY'S DEATH IS OFFICIAL MYSTERY

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The three-story fall which killed George M. Sunday, 46, son of the famous evangelist, William A. "Billy" Sunday, will always remain "either accidental or suicidal," a coroner's jury decided today.

After hearing testimony of the widow, Mrs. Mauryne Sunday, and physicians and police, the jury declared that "on account of the conflicting evidence" it was impossible to determine the cause of the fall.

Mrs. Sunday expressed the opinion her husband had fallen the 75 feet while trying to open a stubborn window screen. She also admitted Sunday had suffered a nervous breakdown and threatened suicide.

# Freshman Grid Player Dies of Brain Injuries

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Hoot Wilson, 19-year-old freshman at Howard college, died late today from injuries received
