ALBANY MAY HAVE HOME-OWNED BANK

Most of Necessary Stock is Subscribed, Report at Linn County Seat

Albany has a good opportunity to secure a home-owned, state chartered bank, it seemed likely yesterday when word was received here that citizens there had subscribed 475 out of a required 500 shares for a new bank in the Linn county city. C. E. and E. B. Williamson, handling the stock subscription list, said they expected to have 500 shares subscribed by September 20.

Albany has had no locally owned, operative bank since the March holidays. Two Portland banks now conduct branches there but have taken over no part of the assets of the two restricted Albany banks.

The new bank's stock is being sold at \$150 a share, and tentative plans for organizing the bank call for \$50,000 capital, \$20,000 surplus and \$5000 undivided profits.

Several subscriptions for 50 shares at an aggregate price of \$7500 have been received. One hundred local owners of the new bank's stock are expected.

While Chairman Jesse Jones of the Reconstruction Finance corporation has advised bank stock owners that the federal government will match money for new bank stock, taking preferred stock for its portion, Oregon state bankers, as yet, cannot utilize this offer as Oregon law prohibits a bank from issuing preferred stock.

In taking subscriptions for the bank stock at Albany, depositors of restricted banks are allowed to utilize restricted deposits to the proportion estimated for immediate release when a new bank has been organized to take over partial assets of the present restricted banks.

SEATTLE BANK IS ROOBED OF \$3000

SEATTLE, Sept. 12—(AP)—Two young unmasked bandits who shouted, "This is a stickup! Line up over there," held up the People's North Seattle bank late today and escaped with approximately \$2000 in coin and currency wadded into a paper shopping bag.

The forced Manager Raymond C. DeLoe to open the vault, so they could get the money, and departed in a large sedan which had been parked outside the bank. They headed north. A stack of bills totaling \$600 in the cashier's cage was left untouched. Taking about three minutes to go through the vault, the bandits backed out and drove away. The bank had no burglar alarm system.

State Hospital Population Now At Peak, Shown

The population of the Oregon state hospital has now reached its peak of 2160, Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent, reported to the state board of control Tuesday.

Men patients number 1253 and women patients 902. There also are listed on the hospital roster 327 patients who are on parole and 63 who have escaped. Dr. Steiner declared that the normal capacity of the hospital was less than 1000, and that the institution was now crowded to capacity.

250 Hop Pickers Declared Needed At Independence

Hop growers in the Independence district need at least 250 more pickers, J. E. Coater, special federal employment agent, notified D. D. Dotson, manager of the free employment bureau here Tuesday afternoon. Forty pickers were sent to that district from Salem Tuesday. Only pickers having their own camping equipment can be hired, Coater said.

Ten more blackberry pickers, five laborers, three woodcutters, one farmer and one mechanic also were placed by the local bureau.

Siletz Railroad Valuation Same As Listed Here

SAVINGS ACCOUNTS INTEREST REDUCED

Banks in Salem are notifying all savings account depositors that prevailing interest rates of three per cent will be reduced to two and one-half per cent, effective October 1. The reduction is in line with the similar cut made in Portland several months ago.

About \$4,500,000 of savings deposits in local banks are affected by the order. Bankers said yesterday the reduction was made because banking income from investments had been reduced. In addition, the new bank deposit guarantee law assumes all members of the guarantee corporation one-half of one per cent of their total deposits.

Local banks several months ago cut interest paid to the school district, city and county on their deposits to a fraction of one per cent. Heretofore two per cent interest on these deposits was paid. Under the 1933 federal bank act, commercial banks cannot pay interest on any demand deposit except from governmental organizations on whose deposits interest must be paid by state law.

Cannery Starts Tomato Packing; 300 Tons Signed

With a run of 300 tons in sight, the Cleary & Hillman cannery at West Salem this morning will start the regular pack of 1933 tomatoes. Cracking of the fruit, noted in early deliveries, will be eliminated with fair weather, it is said. The pack will come from the West Stayton district, and is of the John Bear variety.

The cannery has installed new equipment with separate lines for solid pack and puree pack, and will employ a large number of women.

Bean packing at the West Salem plant probably will continue throughout this week.

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PART TIME SCHOOL AGE LIMITS RAISED

Registration now on, Will Be Higher Than 1932, Director Thinks

Extension of age limits will offer advantages of the part time continuation school to a group of older folk anxious to continue their education as well as to the boys and girls for whom this department of the Salem public school system was originally designed, Miss Violet Swanson, director, said yesterday. Miss Swanson and T. T. Mackenzie, supervisor of vocational education, are this week taking registrations for those attending the continuation classes which open next week in the high school building.

In addition to the regular elementary and high school courses, taught especially for the benefit of boys and girls who find it impossible to attend high school full time because of work, and for older persons, the school will offer special courses in typing, housewifery, training, mechanics, cooking and sewing if there is sufficient call for these subjects.

Credit toward regular grade or high school graduation may be earned.

Indications were that last year's enrollment of more than 100 will be increased this year. Miss Swanson said yesterday that as too great an increase might make it necessary to close registration for some classes she is urging prompt enrollment.

Registration for these classes may be made in room 1-C at the senior high school building between 9:30 and 3:30 o'clock each day. The classroom, featuring an unusually cheerful and artistic color scheme, is on the first floor hallway of the north wing.

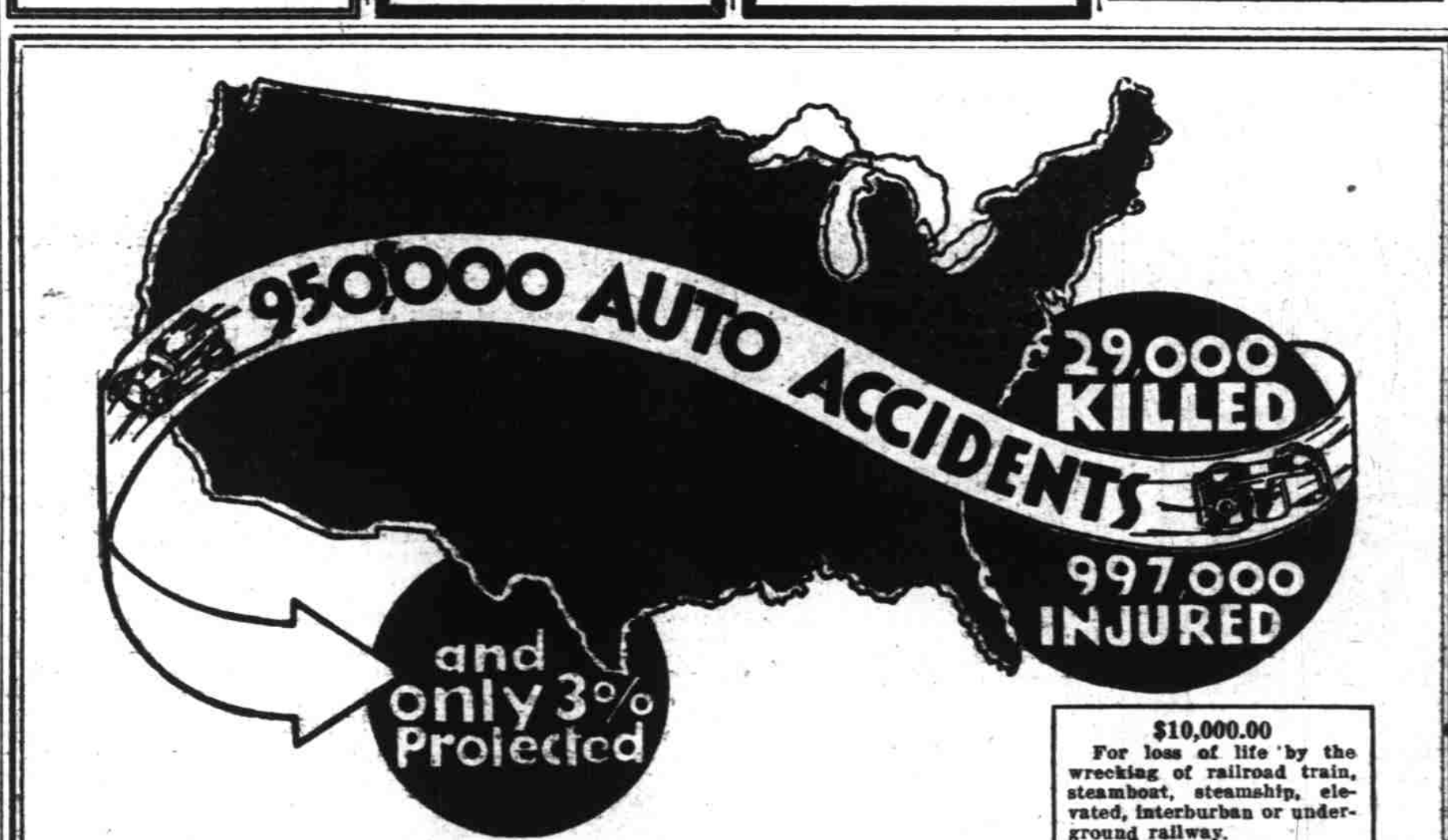
