

GOODWIN TO OPEN WEEK'S CAMPAIGN

A. Ted Goodwin, the Hiways and Hedges evangelist, will begin a week's series of meetings at the Court Church of Christ Tuesday at 7:30 p. m. and each night until Sunday, October 1. Mr. Goodwin is widely known and his message has touched nearly every city, town and hamlet on the coast.

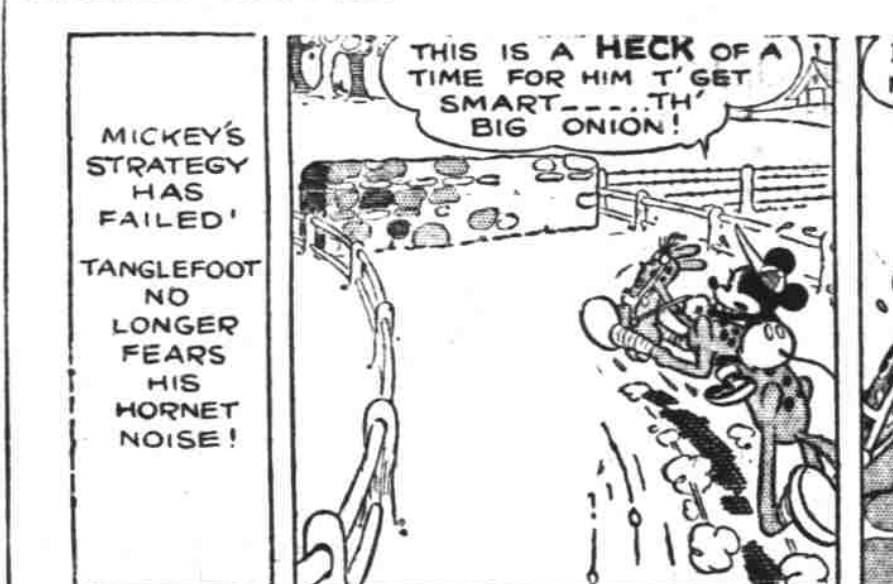

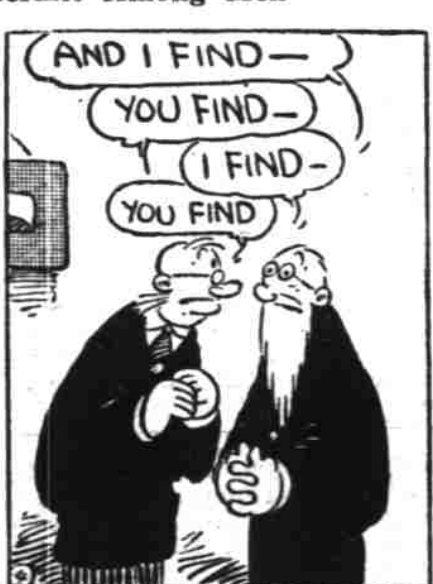

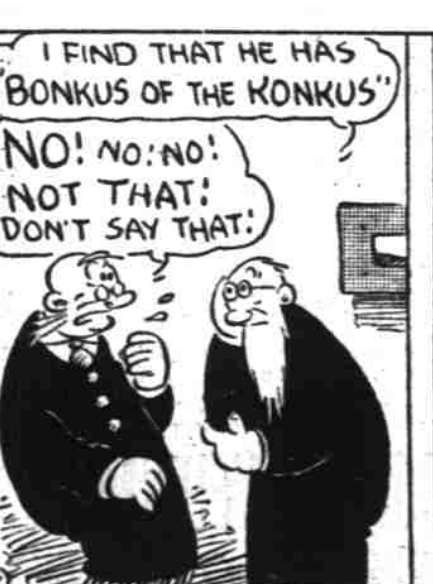
