## WEEK'S TURNOVER

Sales in Piece Goods Marts Heavy; Foreign Markets Generally Firm

BOSTON, Sept. 22,-(AP)the week's high point appeared to The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"During the past week there has been a further substantial turnover in wool, which is estimated to have accounted for an additional twelve to thirteen million pounds of wool. Mostly, the teersts. wools sold have been of the fine and fine medium order in the clean price range of 75-89 cents and holders are now refusing to sell on these levels. Medium wools have actually made a gain of a cent more in price for the week, and scoured wools have advanced several cents for some of the higher qualities.

"The foreign markets are generally firm. London has maintained its opening level of Tuesday, which was, for most descriptions, from ten to fifteen per cent above the close of the preseding Nature's herbs for every ill. H. S. Low, noted Chinese herballst. 473 S. Commercial Street, Salem, Oregon. Established since 1912 in Oakland, series, and the primary markets are all exceedingly firm on a parity with London.

"Heavy sales are reported again n the piece goods markets, cuters-up and clothiers evidently beng convinced that sound statistical position of wool argues for higher prices, especially should there be further inflation.

"Most of the fall mohair clip has been corraled this week in Texas at prices ranging from 40 to 46 % cents for adult and from 50 to 56 cents for kid, which prices mean a rise of about ten cents a pound for sorted hair in this market."


