Mr. and Mrs. Doll Brophy of Paso Robles, Calif., have been visiting with the John Brophys.

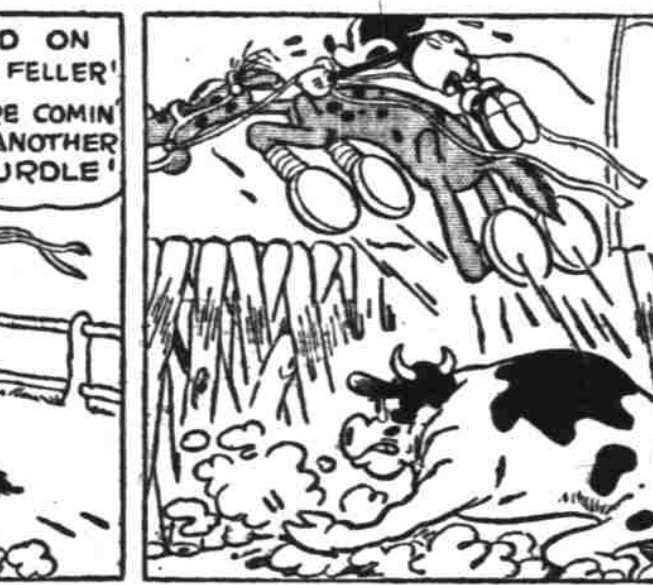
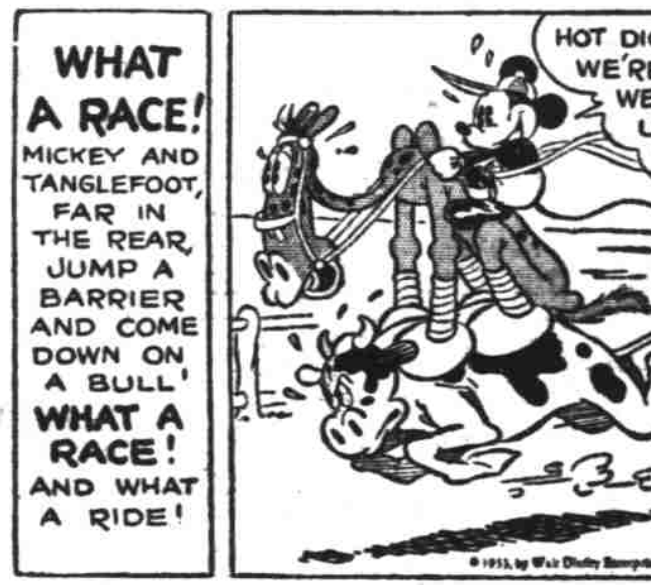

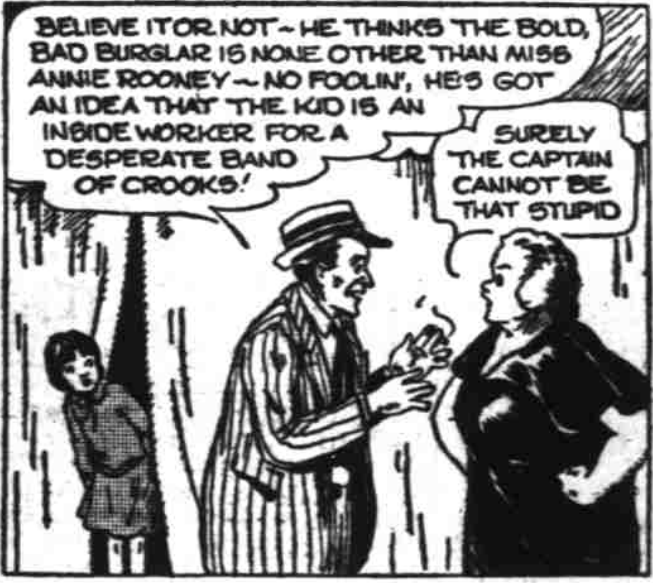

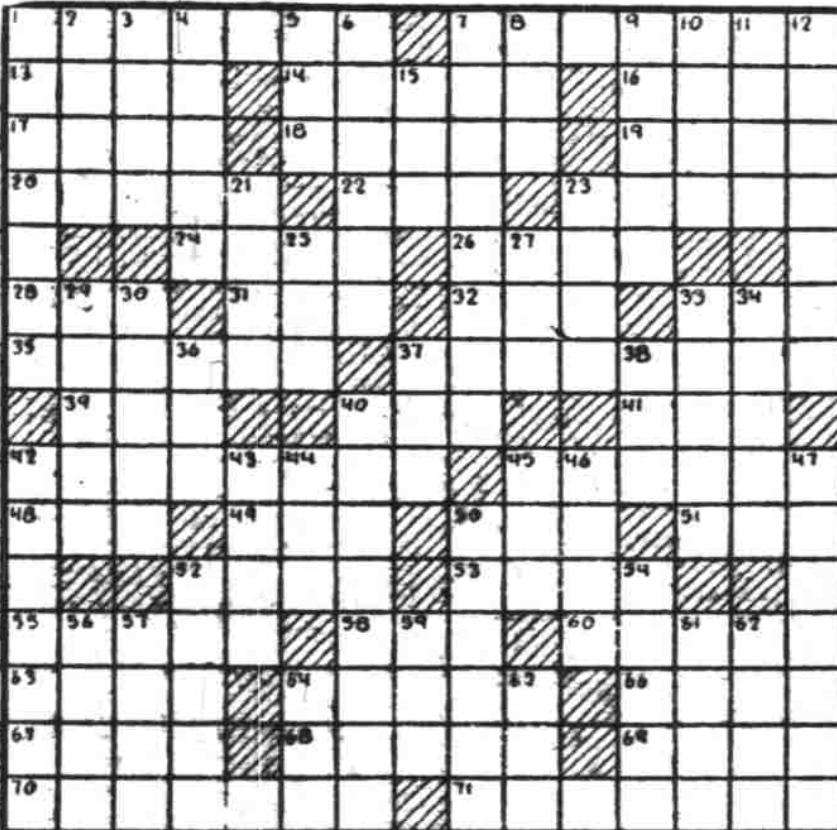
