per cent to 10 per cent; a tax on prize fights, wrestling matches and similar athletic exhibitions; amendment of the income tax law to limit deduction for losses to the current year; amendment of excise and intangibles taxes to reduce exemptions to 50 per cent of the present schedule; a graduated tax on automobiles, based on age and value, estimated to raise \$500,000; return of accounts receivable to the personal property tax rolls; a severance tax on timber and other natural resources; a plan of installment paying of real property taxes in 10 or 12 sums yearly; issuance of short-term highway bonds as an immediate and emergency financing plan if necessary; the bonds to be paid out of anticipated liquor revenues.
