

VERDICT FOUND IN KIDNAP CASE

Jurors Believed Agreed at
Early Hour Friday Night
But Make no Report

both sides had hammered home their points in long arguments. These came to a close shortly after 3 p. m., today when Herbert K. Hyde, United States district attorney, completed a fervent demand for conviction of all 10 defendants.

No leniency was recommended by the judge for Harvey Bailey, pictured by the prosecution as standing in the background because of his fall record and status as a fugitive.

The case of Albert Bates, the machine gunner identified by the four who participated in the kidnapping at the Urichal home the night of July 22, was passed by with little comment. He had been the target of pointing fingers of a dozen accusing witnesses.

Greater leniency was shown the five defendants from St. Paul and Minneapolis: Barney Berntson, Clifford Skelly, Isadora Blumenthal, Sam Kronick and Sam Kosberg.

Judge Vaughn went so far in his charge as to say he failed to order a verdict of not guilty on the "slender theory" that the jury may have heard incriminating evidence that the court overlooked.

As for the Shannons, the Texas farm family sketched by the government as greedy guards who stood over Urichal, armed, and held him while others went to collect the \$200,000 ransom paid, Judge Vaughn gave them no reason for hoping their theory that fear of the kidnappers justified their actions.

"The excuses offered as their reason for holding and guarding the said Urichal do not constitute a defense at law," read the judge.

Gypsies Picked Pockets, Claim

Joseph Aiken, 65-year-old farmer of Route 2, Woodburn, has lost faith in gypsies. Two unidentified gypsy women Friday afternoon picked his pockets of \$240 and disappeared, he says.

Sergeant Mulkey of the state police force investigated the charge and is now working to obtain trace of the women.

Questions People are Asking About Bridge Tournament Fully Answered

MANY persons, interested in the contract bridge tournament and the classes which The Oregon Statesman starts next Tuesday in conjunction with Mrs. William H. Quinn and Miss Betty Harrell, associates, have asked pertinent questions about this enterprise in the last few days, and to facilitate a full understanding of the classes and the tournament, The Statesman today repeats some of the questions and its answers:

Does one change partners each time he progresses at the tournament?

No. The player keeps the same partner throughout the evening. Pairs move or stay at a table together. You are not embarrassed by the mistakes of a new partner.

Can one have a different partner for a different evening?

Certainly. In playing for the grand prizes which are awarded at the end of the tournament, individual, not pair scores are used, so one can change partners from evening to evening, if one desires, or can play with the same partner throughout.

Is the tournament an elimination one?

No: total scores are all that count and there is no elimination.

Must one buy tickets for all eight evenings?

No. You can buy for one or as many evenings as you wish. To be eligible for the grand prizes you must play in at least six out of eight evenings.

Are there to be prizes each evening?

Assuredly yes. In each section—that is nine tables—there will be at least eight prizes each evening, the four highs and the four runners-up receiving awards which will be substantial and attractive.

Are there other prizes?

There will be at least five door prizes each evening, in addition to eight prizes in each section and several feature prizes yet to be announced.

Must I buy my tickets before the night of the tournament?

There is no requirement to purchase tickets before the night of play, provided you have purchased your tickets by 8 p. m. Tuesday, October 3, for that night's play.

Why are we urged to buy tickets early?

To facilitate the seating arrangements and to help The Statesman plan for the number of people who will attend.

Should only expert players enter?

Of course not. There are probably less than 10 players in Salem who have ever played in any tournament. The idea of the tournament is primarily to provide a place to have fun, to improve your game and to meet other persons interested in bridge.

Expertness in play is by no means requirement.

Must I use the Culbertson system?

No. Your bidding and play is entirely your concern. The rules for playing at a tournament are simple and will be explained each night. Your bidding and play is your own affair.

How about the classes: must we buy tickets for the entire series?

No. You can buy for as many or as few lessons as you see fit. It is wise to take the entire course, either beginner's or advanced, as the eight lessons fit one into another. However, each lesson is helpful and complete in itself.

Who play?

Any persons who are residents of Yamhill, Polk, Marion or Linn counties. The idea of the tournament is to confine its benefits to the territory served by The Oregon Statesman. Portland has many experienced players and they are not allowed to enter.

Must we bring cards, tables or other bridge equipment?

Cards, tables, score cards and all other bridge equipment will be furnished all players without charge.

How do we know where to sit?

This is determined by your ticket which assigns you to your table and shows the number of your couple.

Will single tickets be sold to the tournament?

Yes. Your partner will be the person who buys the single ticket across the table from you.

The soldiers, however, stopped men working on the memorial, destroyed it and then posted guards to see that no one approached.

Schramm said non-member banks would have an opportunity to learn of deposit insurance at the state capitol Monday morning at 10 o'clock when A. J. Cooke of the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation, will explain provisions of the plan.

feet long with a 27-foot roadway and sidewalks on either side. It will be the longest highway bridge in Oregon and one of the largest in the west. Its vertical clearance of 148.5 feet at the center arch is said to give ample height for all navigation, hence no draw span will be necessary.

The estimated cost has been placed at \$1,600,000.

More than \$5,000,000, about 30 per cent of which will be a federal grant, is expected to be spent on five coast bridges when the public works administration allocates the funds. Construction should begin by January 1.

TUITION-TRANSPORT DEBT POLICY FACED

County Faces Bills, Likely
To pay in Warrants but
May Advance Cash

The fate of \$100,000 in bills
accumulated against tuition and
transportation funds for the
school year of 1932-33 will be de-
cided by the county court Mon-
day.

At a conference held on this
matter Friday morning with
County Superintendent Fulkerson,
County Judge Siegmund and
Commissioner Nelson attending
the problem of whether the
warrants should be issued, the
county court will advance the money
from the accumulated road fund
was discussed.

Decision in the matter was post-
poned until Monday when Com-
missioner Smith's opinion can be
learned. However, a decision
must be rendered by Monday as
warrants must be issued at that
time to be lawful.

Indications are that the war-
rants will be interest bearing.
When the final repayment of the
advanced funds for the accumu-
lated highway funds of the county
for 1931-32 is made this month
into the highway fund, the fund
will show on the books a balance
of \$349,163.62. But there remains
to be paid the last half of the
state tax, or \$72,000, and the
\$104,981 for which the county
has committed itself on the North
Santiam highway. To advance
\$100,000 for the tuition bill
would make the fund less than
\$100,000 as a liquid reserve for
highway operations.

Sawmills Face
Same Quotas
In Past Month

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 29.—
(AP)—Pacific northwest lumber
mills will be expected to operate
on a basis of 120 hours of work
for the four weeks of October, E.
W. Demarest, president of the
West Coast Lumbermen's associa-
tion, which is acting as an admin-
istrative body for the west coast
division of the national lumber
authority, announced here today.

It is the same production basis
as observed for the previous four
weeks.

The announcement followed a
two-day discussion of lumber code
problems.

Sign is Purchased
For Woodburn and
To be Placed Soon

WOODBURN, Sept. 29.—A neon
sign bearing the name Woodburn
and an arrow pointing toward the
city has been purchased by a com-
mittee of the Woodburn chamber
of commerce, Dr. G. B. Smith and
Ray Glatt, for \$100 from a Den-
ver firm.

The sign will be placed on the
highway and will probably arrive
in two weeks. It will be 60 inches
long and 16 inches high, and pre-
sent the same appearance on both
sides. The sign is of a new con-
struction, there being a box cov-

ering a series of straight white
neon tubings. The letters will be
cut in the box so that the name
Woodburn and the arrow will
show through.

According to estimates it will
cost about \$150 a month to keep
the sign lighted night and day.
The committee plans to ask the
city council to bear expenses of
lighting the sign. Such an ar-
rangement was made with the
city when the old arch was still in
existence.

Assets of Union
Savings Turned
Over to Berrien

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 29.—
(AP)—The turning over of assets
of the Union Savings and Loan
association to O. N. Berrien and
associates of Salt Lake City was
approved here today by Circuit
Judge Tucker.

Such a move had been recom-
mended by Charles H. Carey, state
corporation commissioner and sta-
tutory receiver of the association.
The Berrien plan calls for reor-
ganization of the association and
its operation as a going concern
under a new name, Columbia Sav-
ings and Loan association. Ber-
rien and his associates have
agreed to put up \$50,000 for re-
serve fund stock.
