

WOODBURN BUDGET PROPOSAL \$10,789

Shows Only \$104 Increase;
City Indebtedness Brought
To Low Point

WOODBURN, Sept. 30. — According to figures worked out Tuesday night when the city's budget committee met with the city council to work out an acceptable budget, \$10,789.30 is to be raised by taxation to help operate the city during the coming fiscal year.

The estimated expenses are \$13,339.20, and receipts are estimated at \$2550, the receipts being approximately \$500 cash balance from the previous year, \$200 from the recorder's office, \$1500 from road taxes, \$350 from interest. This year's budget increased \$104.20.

Slight increases were made in the fire department fund for buying new hose; the building maintenance fund was increased \$100, and fuel supplies account was boosted \$20. A sum of \$220 for fire services was added, as was an amount of \$100 for sundries. There was an increase of \$100 in city property assessments and a boost of \$165 for hydrant service. Cuts are made in sums for insurance, engineering, street supplies, labor and interest on refunding bonds.

Indebtedness of the city has been brought to a low figure. At present Woodburn has an indebtedness of \$25,500 in refunding bonds and \$17,368.57 in Bancroft bonds. The city council for the past several years has determined to stay within its budget and has done so. All the Woodburn city warrants can be cashed at par any place they are presented.

The city does not have to carry over a deficit this coming year principally because the time of the beginning of the fiscal year was changed recently, being moved ahead two months to September 1, instead of November 1. The city lost some \$3000, temporarily at least, when the Bank of Woodburn closed its doors. This recent setting ahead of the fiscal year, although not done on that account, has enabled to keep the city from carrying over a deficit.

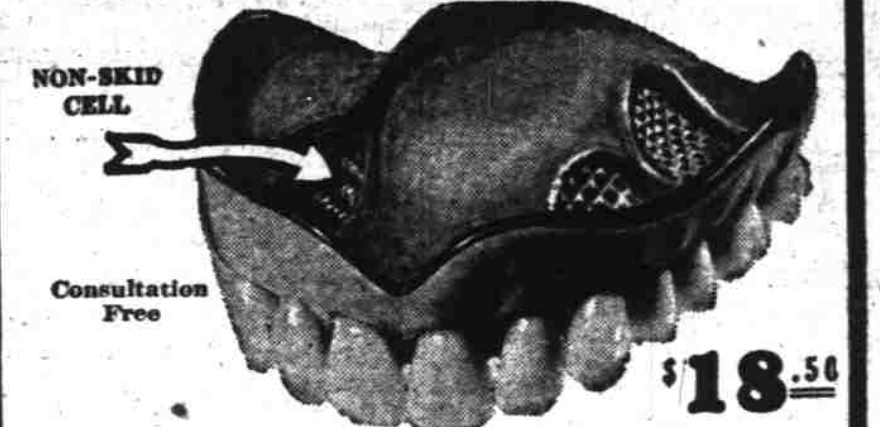
has recently become assistant director of the Kramoff School of Music, is to assist Mr. Kramoff in Portland and this community. The Kramoff branch is to instruct in voice training.
