Piano Recital P.T.A. Plans Event of Friday

AN interesting musical and social event of the season will be given next Friday night, October 6, in Waller hall, by Miss Clara Eness. Miss Eness is head of the piano department of Willamette university school of music, and comes here from Galloway college, Searcy, Ark., where she held a similar position for seven years. She is said by those who know her to possess rare musical gifts and a charming personality.

Miss Eness studied with the famous Russian pianist and teacher, Josef Lhevinne, in Berlin for three years, and was also a student of Dr. Louis Adolph Coerne, organist and theorist. Dr. Coerne, by the way, was the first musician ever to be granted a Ph.D. degree from Yale university.

In her playing, Miss Eness possesses an exceptionally brilliant and facile technique, and displays poise and style in her playing. She performs with an ease and finish that comes only through a thorough understanding of musical values; her tone is warm and full, and a rare interpretive power and a fine taste are always observed in her performances. Her Chopin numbers are especially delightful, and it is noted with pleasure that the Fantasia in F Minor appears on her program for Friday night.

In addition to being a pianist of distinction, Miss Eness is an organist of ability. She has also had experience in two-piano work, and it is to be hoped that in the near future a program of this sort can be arranged.

The program: Chaconne in D Minor, Bach-Busoni; Rondo, Beethoven; Fantasia in F Minor, Chopin; Singing Fountain, Nieman; Mardi Gras in New Orleans, Nieman; La Campanella Etude, Liszt.
