The studio itself has a distinct atmosphere of musicianship with its portraits of the masters and beautiful Steinway grand piano. Miss Melton spent three years in the orient as director of the Cathedral school for girls in Baguio, P. I., and as director of the Toyo Elwa Jo Gakko school of music in Tokyo, Japan. The art treasures she has collected while abroad make her studio most attractive.

Miss Melton has studied with some of the greatest masters of the present day, including William Sherwood of Chicago, Harold Bauer and Wager Swaine in Paris, Severin Eisenberger in Berlin; and Theodor Leschetzky in Vienna, acknowledged as the greatest piano teacher living and who includes Paderewski in his list of pupils. Miss Melton also coached recently with Mme. Liszewska.

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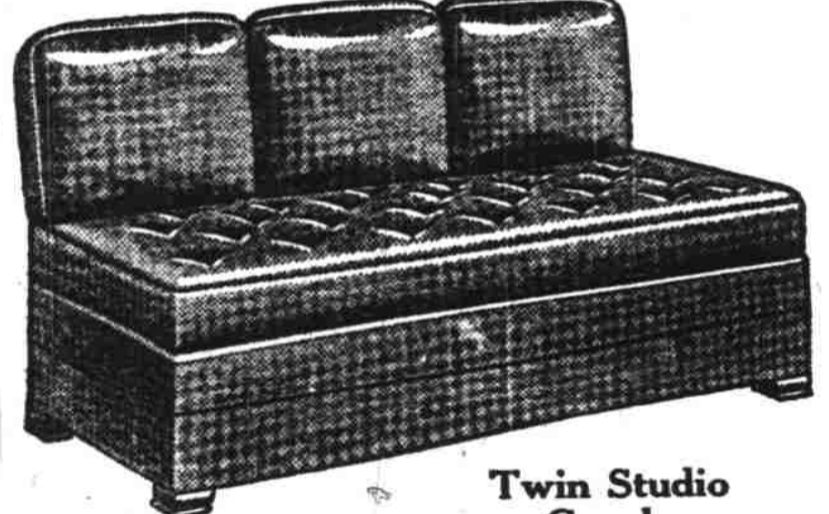
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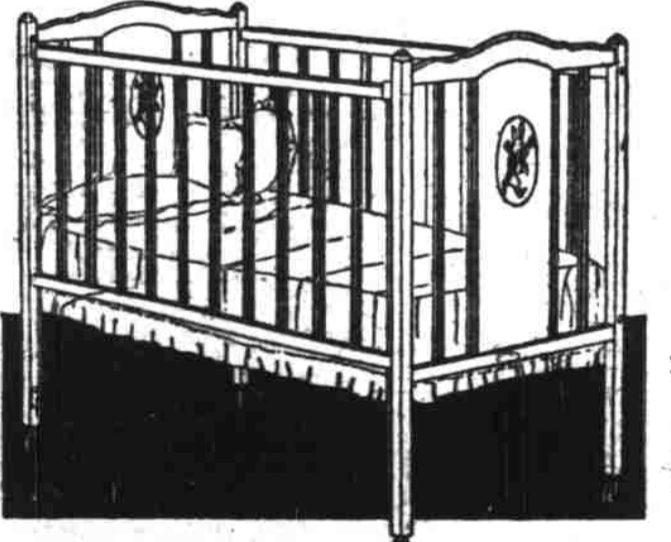
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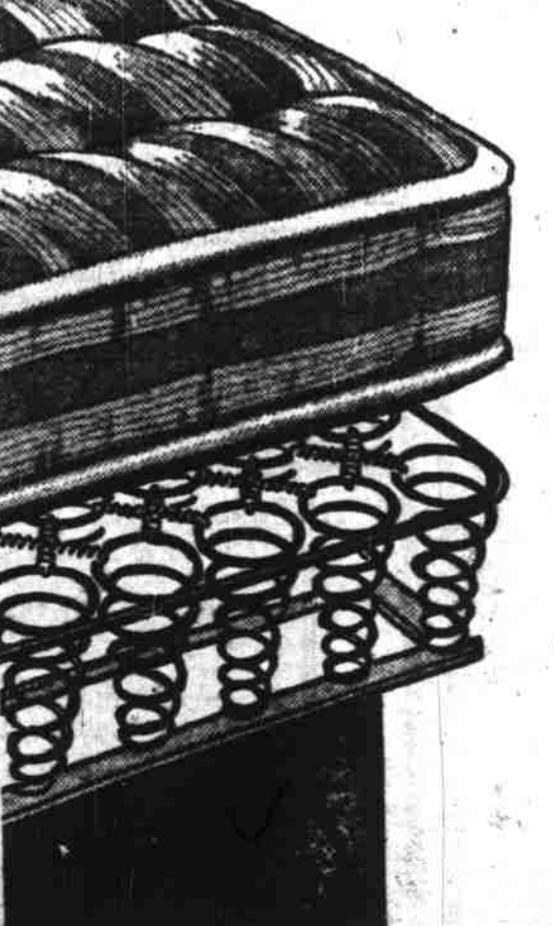


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
