NRA HELD SUCCESS THROUGHOUT NATION

Messenger, District Manager Outlines Accomplishments At Chamber Session

The NRA may already be marked down as a fine success, even should it fail to accomplish a bit more than it has already, Frank Messenger, Portland, district manager of the movement, told the Salem chamber of commerce, assembled yesterday noon in its first meeting of the fall.

Messenger bases his belief upon accomplishments made to date, anyone of which he held has been worth the united effort. First, the NRA has put more than a million individuals back to work.

Second, the NRA has done away with child labor, and to which there was previously much striving but little nationwide success.

Third, and possibly greatest, the NRA has, for the first time in history, given the United States a stock-taking of its business industries—an incidental end which Messenger characterized as the "greatest piece of research ever made" and from which he holds industry and individual will gain much.

"I'm certainly proud of what Salem has done to sell the idea of the Blue Eagle; in fact the whole district of Oregon and Idaho has gone over the top big, with 31,000 agreements already checked off," Messenger said.

The district was allotted only 30,000 agreements. In Oregon, 62,000 persons have been put back to work; in Salem 1300.

He pointed out that employers are learning that the movement is not only for them but that the consumer is considered—but that above all it is a movement to put the entire country back on its feet.

Messenger, referring to charges that the movement is a tax on industry, granted it so, but declared it better to pay this form of tax and put men back to work than to pay huge sums for dole or charity as does England, where many men "are no longer unemployed but unemployable."

2 Institutions to Get \$15,000 Each
Mrs. Britanna G. Fulton who died in Sherman county recently bequeathed approximately \$15,000 of her \$82,000 estate to the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles and a similar amount to the Children's Farm Home near Corvallis, it was announced at the state inheritance tax department Monday. Neither of the bequests carries any restrictions other than that the money shall be expended for the benefit of the two institutions.

Wrong Kind of Tires—Clifford Clemens was arrested yesterday on charge of operating a motor vehicle with hard tires three miles outside the city. He pleaded guilty in justice court and Judge Hayden continued his case 10 days for sentence.

Improper Lights—Operating a car with improper lights caused arrest of L. H. Hoxie, who pleaded guilty in justice court and was fined a dollar, which he was unable to pay and commitment was issued.

Army Man Transferred—Sergeant D. F. Gearhart, in charge of the local recruiting station for the past two months has been transferred to Los Angeles. Gearhart left for his new location Saturday; no word has been received here as to his successor.

Pettifrow Executor—E. M. Pettifrow has been named executor of the estate of the late Jerusha A. Suter, who left assets evaluated at \$2136, according to an appraisal filed in probate court Monday.

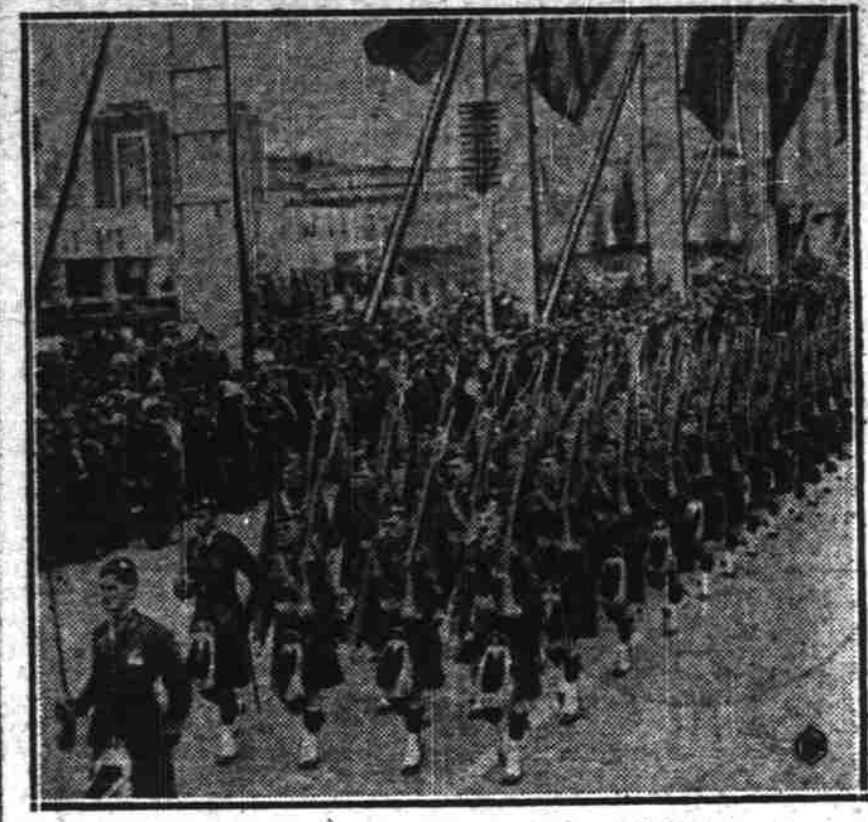

FULL TIME AIRWAY LIGHTING RETURNS

Fliers Blame Disappearance Of Young on Past Part Time Schedule

The part time lighting system, blamed by many airmen for the disappearance last spring of William Young, 28-year-old Portland aviator, is a thing of the past for Oregon airways. Definite assurance that dusk to dawn operation of airways beacons will be restored at once in this state has been received from the secretary of commerce by Congressman James W. Mott.

Climaxing considerable correspondence with the congressman, who, with many other Oregon residents, has been anxious to see the end of the part time airways lighting schedule, yesterday's message recalled here the story of the youthful Portland flier who set off at 11:20 o'clock on the night of June 16, from Medford and was never seen again. Days of

searching failed to bring out a trace of man or plane. Although at the time it was not emphasized, local airmen said last night that Young's disappearance marked the first night of the trial of part time lighting of airways. The night was foggy, but under normal conditions Young should have arrived at Portland at one o'clock or shortly thereafter.

During the summer months beacons have been turned out at 1 o'clock in the morning. Lee Evely of the local airport said last night that the new regulations would probably mean that the Salem beacon as well as the one at Shaw and those further up the valley would remain lighted during the entire night.

STUDY BEER PLAN AT MT. ANGEL

MT. ANGEL, Oct. 2.—A delegation of officials from Oregon City were in Mt. Angel last week to gather data on the municipal beer garden for the League of Oregon Cities. The league intends to go before the state legislature, if it meets in special session, and ask that the cities be given power to handle the liquor problem by installing municipally-owned beer and liquor dispensaries.

Among the officials visiting here were O. A. Pace, mayor of Oregon City; J. L. Franzen, city manager, and C. Schuebel, city attorney.

At present Mt. Angel is the only city in Oregon operating a municipal beer dispensary.

BONTRAGER IS WINNER

P. U. C. TO COLLECT FEES, THOMAS SAYS

Statement Holds fee Section Unaffected by Circuit Court's Decision

Answering truck operators' protests over arrests now being made, Charles M. Thomas, state utilities commissioner, yesterday issued a statement declaring that the recent decision of Judge Lewelling of the Marion county circuit court holding invalid those provisions of the 1933 truck and bus law relating to private and contract carriers does not in any way affect the subject of fees.

"Therefore," the statement read, "the office of public utilities commissioner finds itself in a position that the existing law requires enforcement with the exception of those provisions mentioned specifically in the injunction order. The state police department, under the act, is the field enforcing body. There being no injunction, the state utilities commissioner and the state police department have no alternative than to proceed under the provisions of the law.

"A number of private and con-

tract carriers apparently feel that they should not be compelled to comply with the act for the reason that the case involving its constitutionality is now in the state supreme court. These persons have a complete remedy which they apparently have failed to recognize. Many carriers in the same classes have followed the proper course to protect themselves by paying their fees under protest.

"This permits the commission to proceed under the law and perform its duties and at the same time protects the carrier in event the act or any material part of it is held to be invalid by the higher court. The legislature drafted and enacted the present law. It should be clear to all that the administrative agency has no authority, and it would be entirely improper, to refuse to administer the law as instructed by its terms.

Briefs in the case have been filed in the supreme court and arguments of attorneys will be heard this week.

TO CHECK STEEN'S DRIVERS

William Hammond, in charge of the state automobile operators' bureau, left for the Steen Mountain district in Harney county yesterday where he will make a check of drivers' permits. Reports received by Hammond indicated that many automobile drivers in the Steen Mountain district had failed to comply with the operators' law and obtain their new driver's licenses.

MINISTERS PROTEST WALKATHON SCHEME

First fall meeting of the Ministerial association was held Monday morning at the Y. M. C. A. with routine matters and a short program occupying the time. C. A. Sprague gave a short talk on "Church Advertising" in which he developed the idea that evangelism is the church's synonym for advertising.

The ministerial quartet, composed of H. C. Stover, W. Earl Cochran, R. V. Wilson and Fletcher Galloway, sang. Britton Ross, E. T. Neal and Charles C. Haworth were appointed as a committee to arrange for the annual Thanksgiving services.

A resolution asking that the city council vote against the proposed Walkathon as a detrimental influence was passed by the association of which Fletcher Galloway of the Nazarene church is president and R. V. Wilson of the United Brethren church is secretary.
