His application for Italian citizenship already in the hands of Premier Benito Mussolini, George Nelson Page, scion of one of America's oldest families and descendant of one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, has renounced his American citizenship and will shortly leave Uncle Sam's bed and board forever. Page's action, he says, is the result of his admiration for Fascism, as practiced by Mussolini, which he thinks is the ideal state and far in advance of the "Capitalistic Futility" which prevails in America. Page's wife, the former Marjorie Grace Stricker, of Chicago and their infant son, George Blunt Page, will accompany him to Italy and share his new life in the cradle of Fascism.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS CONFER WITH MEIER

The state of Oregon, through R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, will sponsor a movement to enlist the various states in a program for a further allocation of highway grant money out of public works funds at a meeting of the national association of state highway commissioners and engineers which opens at Milwaukee, Wis., next week. Baldock will leave for Milwaukee Friday night.

Baldock will submit a resolution to the convention placing the association on record as petitioning President Roosevelt to set aside an additional amount of public works funds for distribution among the states for highway operations.

The public works act set aside \$400,000,000 as a minimum for road work to be distributed among the states on a basis of population, area and mileage of federal aid roads. The act also authorized the president to increase this amount at his discretion, but thus far only \$100,000,000 has been allocated.

FALLS CITY SCHOOL HAS 113 ENROLLED
